HELEN JACOBS GOES INTO SEMI-FINAL BY FINE TENNIS DISPLAY

WIMBLEDON, Eng., July 3.—(AP)—Helen Hull Jacobs, the American champion and top-seeded favorite today won her quarter-final match in the all-England tennis championships, but little Sarah Paley, the other American survivor, was eliminated by the veteran French woman, Mme. Rene Mathieu, 6-3, 6-5, 6-2.

Mrs. Jacobs, playing flawlessly, defeated Cilli Aussem, the German girl who won the title in 1931, 6-0, 6-2.

Dorothy Round, main hope of the English, also won her quarter-final encounter from Mile. Lolette Payot of Switzerland, 6-4, 6-2, but Margaret (Peggy) Scriven, ranking English No. 1 was put out by the Australian champion, Joan Hartigan, 3-6, 6-3, 6-1.

Mrs. Jacobs plays Mrs. Hartigan, an unseeded player, in one semi-final while Mrs. Round and Mme. Mathieu meet in the other.

Sidney B. Wood, Jr., a semi-finalist in men's singles, and Richard Norris Williams, America's cup captain, continued their advance in doubles, defeating C. S. Hilton and A. Hulton, of England, 6-3, 6-3, 6-3 in the second round.

Jack Says Max Packs Hardest Wallop of All

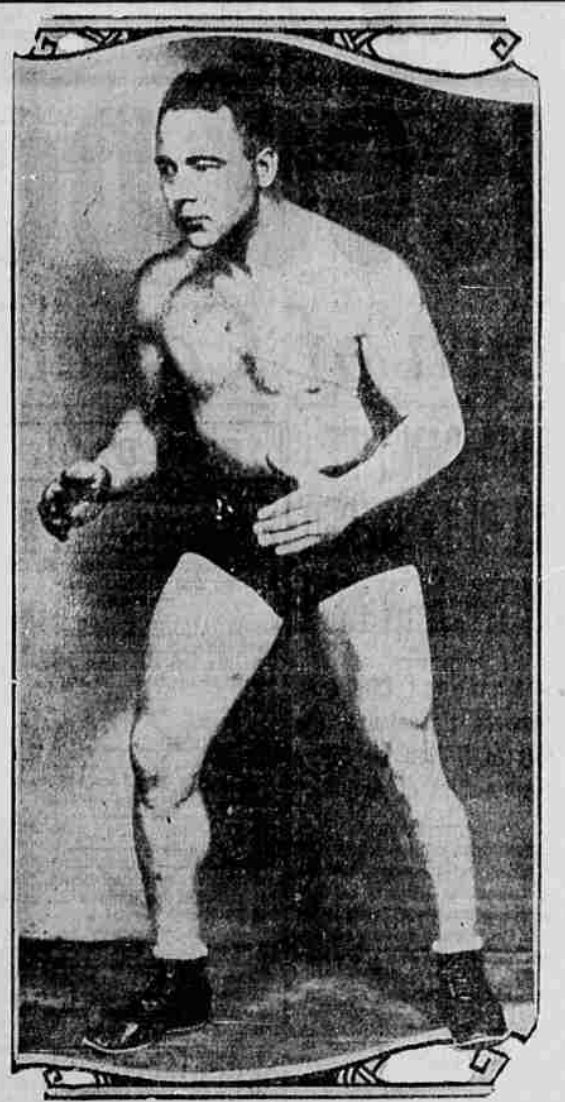

OWENS FREEDOM UNTIL TRIAL IS HOPE ON BONDS

Friends of Jim Owens of the Wimer district, indicted for alleged liquor violation today sought to secure his release from the county jail on bonds, pending trial. The amount was set by Judge H. D. Norton last Saturday at \$1000. Owens is specifically charged with the sale of a pint of moonshine at a Wimer dance. The district attorney's office says a number of complaints had been filed against him, and that he had been warned to discontinue the alleged practice. Owens is 72 years old, and an old resident of the county. Application for bonds was made before Justice of the Peace William R. Coleman.

Pearl Webb, Bernice Kennedy and Jonathan Richardson held in the county jail for alleged larceny from the person, were each sentenced to six months in the county jail on a vagrancy charge and the sentence was remanded upon condition that they leave Jackson county within 24 hours. This they agreed to do. The trio were alleged to have stolen \$40 from the pockets of a Jacksonville miner, while he was a visitor at a North Pacific Highway beer place.

No formal action has yet been taken on the indictments returned by the grand jury last Saturday, against Evan L. Crow and Chester O. Webb, youths, charged with taking and using an automobile without permission, and Henry H. Dyson, charged with violation of liquor laws. The grand jury took no action against Mrs. Dyson, jointly accused with her husband in the initial complaint.

DIPHTHERIA DEATH RATE DECREASING STATISTICS SHOW

There has been one case of diphtheria reported in Medford this week and there has been a marked and continuous decrease in the death and case rate in Oregon since 1924. Deaths from diphtheria have decreased from 107 in 1924 to 11 in 1933. In the ten year period 623 Oregon children were thus spared.

The number of cases dropped from the high figure of 1404 in 1924 to 112 in 1933. This decrease we attribute to the active campaign of immunization carried on this state since 1924 as every other means of control had been used up until this time with meager results.

There have been more than 1500 children immunized against diphtheria in this county in the last three years. Immunization with toxoid gives protection in 90 per cent of the cases but so far we have had no cases of diphtheria in any child who has been immunized with toxin-antitoxin or toxoid.

Out of the three thousand injections by the health department in the past two years, there have been no cases of serum reaction and less than a dozen who had headaches—
