

IRRIGATION LOAN NEARS AS BONDS ARE SUBSCRIBED

Olen Arnsperger, general manager of the Medford Irrigation district, reported today that 94 per cent of the bonds necessary for securing of a Reconstruction Finance Corporation loan, for the refinancing of the district, had been pledged, and that the district had been advised that this was sufficient to start negotiations. The district seeks \$405,000.

Time of completion of the loan is uncertain, Arnsperger said, due to the great amount of detail involved, and that it was probable that Attorney Porter J. Neff would be sent to Washington, D. C., to speed it. Arnsperger said Attorney Neff was well acquainted with all details and that time, telegraphing and letter writing would be saved by sending him east to answer questions, explain purposes and confusing points, and formally close the deal for the loan.

The irrigation water situation in the district continues unchanged, and is coming out in accordance with the early forecasts of Arnsperger. Water is being delivered to orchardists and farmers, according to quotas, and it is expected the delivery of quotas will be completed by August 15. Irrigation water is now being used heavily for the maturity of pears and alfalfa.

SCHERMERHORN'S ORDER RECEIVED

Formal order directing the sheriff of Jackson county to deliver Gordon L. Schermernhorn, former sheriff, under a three-year sentence in state prison on ballot their conspiracy conviction, to the warden of the penitentiary at the expiration of a 14 days' stay of execution, was filed in circuit court today. The order is signed by Circuit Judge George P. Skipworth of Eugene.

The execution stay expires Saturday, July 14. Sheriff Olmstead said this morning that no plans had been made, but he expected to obey the court order on July 15, in order to give Schermernhorn the full time allowed. The sheriff said he had not been advised of any steps for Schermernhorn to deliver his own commitment to the warden. The defendant has advised friends that he would make a request to do this.
