

GIANTS AND YANKS PLACED IN SERIES BY STANDING DOPE

Leaders At Half-Time Mark Nominated For Championship Play By An Old Adage In Major Baseball.

The Fourth of July, the day on which the experts say you can look at the top of the baseball standings and pick the pennant winners, has passed and if the adage holds true the New York Giants and New York Yankees will meet in the world series this fall.

Out of the annual array of holiday double headers, attended by crowds totaling in number more than 905,000, came the Giants with the only twin victory scored in the National league and a lead of three games over the Chicago Cubs. The Yankees, although unable to get better than an even break, held a slim one-game margin over the fast traveling Detroit Tigers.

The Giants, who a year ago dropped two games to the Braves and still held a five-game lead, trounced Boston yesterday, 9 to 1, and 15 to 0. Two good pitching performances marked the splitting of the St. Louis Cardinals-Chicago Cubs double bill. The Cards won the first game, 6 to 2, but Chicago took the nightcap by the same score.

The Pirates tightened their hold on fourth place by beating the Cincinnati Reds, 5 to 1, in the first game, only to lose the second, 4 to 3. The Brooklyn Dodgers defeated the Phillies, 8 to 5, in the first game, but the Phillies won the second, 11 to 2.

In the American league, the Red Sox slammed the offerings of their former teammate, Danny MacFayden, for 12 hits and seven runs in the first five innings and then went on to win, 8 to 5. The Yanks squared accounts by taking the second, 10 to 4.

The Athletics trimmed the Senators twice for the only double victory in the American league. The first was won, 10 to 9, and the second, 6 to 5.

The Tigers lost the first game to the Indians, 8 to 6, and then came back to capture the second, 5 to 4.

The White Sox gained a split with the Browns. They took the second, 3 to 2, after Dick Coffman had shut them out, 2 to 0, in the opener.

COAST DECATHLON ENTRANT WINNER

CINCINNATI, July 5.—(AP)—A personable young man from the Pacific coast today is the new national decathlon champion of the A. A. U.

He is Robert Clark, who runs, pole vaults and does a number of other things while wearing the colors of the Olympic club, San Francisco.

He bettered Jim Bausch's 1932 Olympic record in five of the ten events, which closed yesterday. Clark tallied 7955.080, while the Olympic Games mark set by Bausch was 8462.23.

Joe Hall, Tallahassee, Fla., was second, with 7488.890, and R. Baldry, a running mate of Clark's from the Golden Gate, was third with 7401.180.

3 DIE IN FALL OF GRANDSTAND

NEW YORK, July 5.—(AP)—Three men died and approximately three score were injured as a grandstand collapsed, pitching 300 inmates of the city's correction hospital into a struggling mass of humanity.

Eleven hundred other inmates of the institution, where a riot marked the Fourth of July a year ago, joined guards and doctors in orderly rescue work. Officials who had arranged yesterday's festivities, largely to prevent a repetition of the disorder, called police but reinforcements found nothing to do.

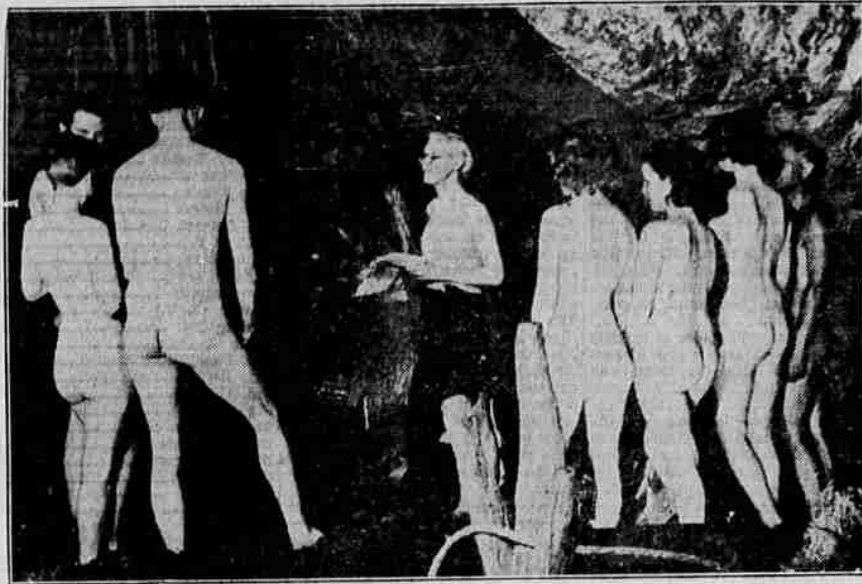

Playing before a large holiday crowd, Medford's Gilmore Lions defeated the Crescent City Merchants 5-4 on the bay city diamond Wednesday. It was the second meeting of the two nines, first game resulting in a Crescent City win by the same score.

Led by the heavy stock of Dick Lewis, Gilmore shortstop, the Lions took the lead and blanked Crescent City till the seventh, when one run gave the losers renewed courage and three more tallies in the eighth.

Scoring started in the third inning, when Sakralda walked, followed by Ward's single and a hit on an error by Kenton to load the sacks with only one away. Bob Lewis' smoking double scored Sakralda and Ward.

Again in the fifth Sakralda started Gilmore scoring machinery when he singled to get aboard and Kenton drove out a ground ball that was muffed, the final melee leaving Sakralda on third and Kenton on second. A hard-hit single by Bob Lewis again sent two men across the plate to leave the score 4-0. The two tallies that decided the game in Gilmore's favor, came in the eighth inning, when Leonard Hall, Miner center fielder, borrowed for the game, drove a triple to right center, going home on an overthrow at third. Sakralda then singled, followed by Dick Sakralda's high triple over center field.

OLD "CROW BAIT" HORSE BRINGS IN RICH PURSES

CHICAGO, July 5.—(AP)—Two years ago D. A. Woods, a wholesale grocer from Benton, a town of 7,000 in the coal mining region of southern Illinois, purchased Indian Runner, a one-time broken down, crippled horse, for \$3,000. Yesterday Indian Runner won the Stars and Stripes handicap and \$10,750 at Arlington Park for the second consecutive year, bringing his total winnings to date to \$45,000 and ranking him among the top three of the American handicap stars in performance.

The story behind this game five year old son of Dis Donc II—Indian Maiden, with a heart as big as a house, reads like a tale from the Arabian Nights.

Owner Woods liked the looks of Indian Runner despite his previous condition, and bought him. He turned him out for a month, nursed him along, then brought him back to the races with the result that he broke the track record at Lincoln Fields in his first start. Since then he has had a monopoly in winning the handicap stakes in the west.

WHEAT ACREAGE EYED IN COUNTY

Wheat acreage surveyors under the direction of County Agent Robert G. Fowler are now abroad in the valley, measuring the wheat fields to see that the growers have complied with the acreage requirements as set forth in agricultural adjustment act contracts. Ten men, divided into four crews, are making the survey.

The collected data will be used as a basis for July payments by the government.

County Agent Fowler reported that in this county there would be little if any deviation from the contract acreages.

Fowler reports that cutting and shocking of the valley wheat is now under way and that threshing will start, soon. Excellent stands of wheat prevail in the Jacksonville, Willow Springs and Sams Valley districts. He said: "Some of the wheat is normal, some above normal, and some below normal." He said the latter condition prevailed chiefly in the south end of the county.
