

# Rogues Will Play Ewauna Here Sunday

## LOCALS MUST WIN TO RETAIN CHANCE OF WINNING FLAG

### Sargent and Calvert Will Be Medford Battery; Ewauna Boasts Powerful Combination of Diamond Talent

In addition to the crucial game between the Medford Rogues and the Ewauna Box Co. team of Klamath Falls, at the fairgrounds here Sunday, it was announced today that the American Legion Juniors and the Prospect nine would clash in a preliminary, scheduled for 1 p. m.

The Prospect and Junior outfits are bitter enemies, the youngsters having taken a 10-inning game from the resort town boys recently by the narrow margin of 10-9. The Prospectors are coming to town Sunday with the avowed intention of evening the count and a slam-bang affair is promised in the first half of the double-header at the fairgrounds. The Rogues-Ewauna game is scheduled for 2:30.

Larry Pepper will pitch for the Juniors and Jim Bayliss is expected to work behind the bat.

Medford's newly found battery consisting of the two Bills, Sargent and Calvert, will take the field Sunday at the Jackson county fairgrounds against the Ewauna Box Co. team from Klamath Falls in a game which will be crucial to the Rogues in that they must win to retain any possible chance of overtaking Grants Pass before the season ends.

One defeat for Medford and the Rogues will be out of the race, which has only five more games to go.

**Sargent Holds Hope**

In Sargent, Medford has the best chance of pace hurler in the league. Last Sunday against Shaw-Bertram, he exhibited in the neighborhood of six different-speed balls and for the entire game, had the visitors off balance and figuratively breaking their backs at his queer acting shoots. Sargent really hasn't a fast ball in comparison to other league hurlers nor has he a terribly sharp breaking curve. It is his baffling change of pace and marvelous control that makes him so effective. He bats from the right in the Dixie league where he won 14 and lost 13 games last year.

Forming the receiving end of the Rogue battery will be the sensational 16 year old Billy Calvert. Calvert is from Washington where he has been working in the timber league and is the nephew of Dr. Kins, of Medford.

**Has Great Arm**

The youngsters has a machine gun left arm and is a great receiver considering the little experience he has had. He takes a natural, healthy cut at the plate, getting a double and triple last week, and is certainly the most promising material to be seen in Medford for years.

The balance of the Rogue team will probably spread out in this fashion: Orr, first base; Hulen, second base; Haight, short stop; Williams, third base; Swanson, left field; Haffard, center field; and Jay, right field with Joania and Reinking in reserve and Paul Hess ready to go on the mound at any time.

**Catcher Impresses**

On the mound for Ewauna will be Clyde Carlstrom, with the big, over-hand curve ball. Biana will be behind the bat. Biana was sent to Klamath Falls by the San Francisco Mission, where he lasted this spring until well into the regular season. He is probably the best receiver in the league.

Sargent's work is well mapped out for him if he is to beat Ewauna. In the first place he must stop Glen Putnam, Pacific university player who is holding down third base for the Box Makers and hitting at a .413 clip; and in the second place, he must stop a stop to the heavy hitting of Haley, Ewauna first baseman, who is pestering the pellet for a .387 mark. Haley is the only player in the league to hit consecutively in every scheduled game.

**SENATORS NEARLY OUT OF RUNNING**

If it's still too early to count them entirely out of the running, the Washington Senators' chances of retaining the American league pennant nevertheless grow slimmer and slimmer each day.

The partial collapse of what was an all-star pitching staff a year ago, and injuries to key-men, notably Joe Judge and Luke Sewall, have contributed to the champions' poor showing in the last three weeks.

Their third successive setback and their eleventh defeat in 18 games, an 8-3 trouncing from the New York Yankees yesterday, left the Senators in fifth place, eight extremely large games out of first place.

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## WIN BY WAGNER MEANS BIG STEP IN MAT GAME

Gus Sonnenberg, grappler, who has gained a national reputation and namesake in his spectacular flying tackle, will find himself up against a thoroughly trained athlete when he appears here against big Don Wagner, former O. S. C. grid star, on the wrestling card at the armory next Monday night.

Sonnenberg, who weighs in the neighborhood of 210, will be offset by 20 pounds by the Oregonian, who touts the scales at 230. And all Wagner's 230 pounds, which compose a giant frame that glides about with the grace of a panther, are trained knots of muscle, tempered by long years of athletics and months of work behind a plow on a farm near Corvallis.

The farmer-grappler takes a pride in his physique, and it has gained for him the title of former national champion and a list of victories wherever he has appeared on the mat. If he can beat Sonnenberg next Monday night, it will be the biggest feather in his cap and a tribute to his year of preparation for just such a chance as Monday night's hot offers.

But Promoter Mack Lillard, not satisfied with this contest alone, has rounded up two grapplers to mix in the 45-minute semi-final who would ordinarily afford a main bout in themselves. Ad Herman of Germany and Louie Andrews of Greece, two newcomers to the Medford arena, will be seen in action in this part of the triple-event show.

For the 30-minute curtain raiser, Rollin Warren, agile Klamath Falls Copco engineer, will grapple Professor Edward Newton, Salem teacher. Newton is another newcomer to the local arena and is an aggressive and sturdy match for Warren, although a more recent entrant into the game.

Fans have long awaited this mat program, and interest has been stirred to a high pitch by its several postponements. Promoter Lillard, however, announces that if the interest is maintained he hopes to bring Jim London, world champion, here for a bout during his anticipated western tour.

## BRITISH TENNIS TITLE RETAINED

**WIMBLEDON, Eng., July 6.**—(P)—Frederick John Perry, 26-year-old English tennis star, today defeated Jack Crawford of Australia, the defending champion, 6-3, 6-0, 7-5, in the men's singles final of the all-England tennis championships to keep the title in England for the first time in 25 years.

It was the year Perry was born that A. W. Gore, one of the immortals of the English courts, won the Wimbledon championship. Since then the stars of Australia, France and the United States have monopolized the titles.

The tall, dark-haired Englishman was not to be denied today as he unloosed one of the most blazing games the famous center has witnessed in years, to blast the Australian ace off the courts.

## CHANNEL CUT IN GANFIELD RIFFLE

**GOLD BEACH, Ore., July 6.**—(Special)—A crew of local sports and commercial fishermen, working under the direction of State Officers Guy Forsyth and Irving Larson, have cut a channel 150 feet long, three feet deep, through what is known as the Ganfield riffle, about five miles above this city. This work was done to enable salmon and steelhead to make their way upstream to the spawning ground.

With the Rogue river unseasonably low and still falling, water on the cobles of the riffle was barely ankle deep. The riffle is about a half-mile long, running diagonally across the stream. More work will have to be done on the channel to keep it clear.

Cox meets Gus Sonnenberg here next Friday night.

C., and Cecil McGill, 190, Emeryville, Cal., drew after three rounds of clean and clever wrestling, and Harry Kent, 225, Hillsboro, defeated Jack King, 208, Portland, with a body press following a series of flying tackles.

## SOUTHERN LEAGUE HAS TEN BATTERS WITHIN .300 CLASS

Twenty-seven Southern Oregon league players are hitting .300 or better while only 10 are in the charmed .300 circle. And of those 10, only eight are classed as regulars.

Al Droulette, Grants Pass receiver, still leads the parade by a wide margin. His .514 mark is 102 points ahead of Glen Putnam, Ewauna, in second place.

Wakeman actually heads the Shaw-Bertram players with .385 though Fuller, who has seen action in but four games, is their nominal leader with an average of .400.

Paul Haffard, Medford outfielder, is hitting .326 to lead his team.

Haley, big Ewauna first secker, has connected safely in every league game to the be the lone player with that record.
