FAMED EXPONENT OF FLYING TACKLE TO SHOW WARES

Local Fans Have First Opportunity to See Dynamite Gus in Action—Fine Support Card Also Promised

Two former football stars will meet on a canvas grid-iron tonight in the main event at the armory, when Gus Sonnenberg, ex-gridster from Dartmouth, the grappler who originated the famous flying pile-drive, tangles with Don Wagner, ex-O. S. C. football player, the 230 pound muscle man with the scientific training.

Sonnenberg, 210, faces a 20-pound handicap besides the giant frame of the Oregon farmer, but has the advantage of long experience in the ways of the ring. Predictions run in favor of the ex-Dartmouth grid star, but Wagner may have something that Sonnenberg lacks, a careful, scientific training which has gained for him a championship of the Pacific northwest.

SALE OF MELON AND TOMATO TO REQUIRE STAMP

PORTLAND, July 9.—(AP)—On July 15 the melon and tomato marketing agreement for Oregon and Washington will become effective, the provisions calling for a stamp tax on all packages of melons and tomatoes sold in the two states.

The tax will defray regulatory expense and provide for maintaining a minimum price, established at a price barely covering cost of production.

The head of the joint control committee for the two crops is H. O. Hawkins of Yakima, who handled the strawberry code for Washington. Morton Tompkins of Yamhill is president; Wesley Williams of Roseburg was elected treasurer, and C. H. Dills of Wapato, Wash., secretary.

Roy Jewett of Salem was named public representative of the group. About 275,000 crates of cantaloupes, one million boxes of tomatoes, 900 tons of casaba, and 2000 tons of watermelons will be brought under the code terms.

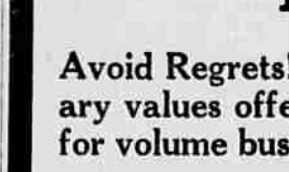

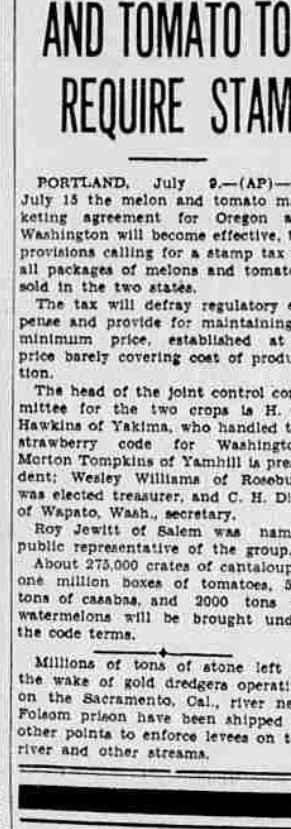

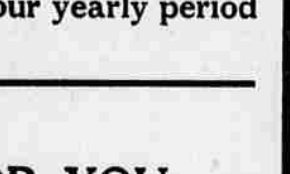
