



SONNENBERG PINS DON WAGNER WITH FLYING TACKLES

Famed Grid Star Wins in Straight Falls After Taking Punishment From Oregonian's Body Scissors

"Dynamite" Gus Sonnenberg, former Dartmouth grid star and ex-world champion grappler, brought his famous flying tackle into action in the main event at the armory last night to take two straight falls from "Iron Man" Don Wagner, ex-O. S. C. grid star, after a thorough mauling in the cobra arms and vice-like legs of the Oregon farmer had reduced his dynamite to the proportions of a Fourth of July "fizzer."

For 20 minutes in the first fall the giant Oregon Slater clamped grunting holds on Sonnenberg, and broke everything the ex-champion had to offer to bear down again and again with a punishing arm lock. But "Dynamite Gus" had not earned his name for nothing, and after Wagner had bounced into the ropes hard enough to split a corner post, Sonnenberg met him half way with his devastating shoulder ram, and used a body press to take the fall.

Wagner bounced off the ropes again at the second going, but this time with a flying body scissors landing squarely about Sonnenberg's midriff. From then on for 12 1/2 minutes it was a series of crushing solar holds, replaced once with a bear hug, that put the ex-champion into the groggy state from which he unleashed his second "Sonnenberg" and then used another body press to win the watch.

The giant Corvallis farmer used stored up power in his lanky frame time and again to pry himself out of dangerous holds, and let loose repeated flares of speed and strategy that made him the strong favorite of the bout.

Big Swede Anderson, 205, local fire-ladder, substituting for Louis Andrews of Greece in the semi-final event, lost two out of three falls to Ad Herman, 202, German grappler, in a circus bout. Anderson won the first fall in 15 minutes with a leg stretch and toe hold, and lost the second in 4 1/2 to Herman's punishing hammerlock. Herman won the odd fall in 30 seconds when he took advantage of Anderson's strained arm with another hammer hold. The bout was a wild meleé from start to finish and had the fans roaring at the local boy's own exhibition of dynamite.

Warren Pins Prof. Professor Edward Newton, youthful Salem teacher, put up a good bout in the curtain raiser against Rollin Warren, grappling Klamath Falls Cope engineer, who used a surr board to take the single fall in 16 minutes. It was nip and tuck all the way, with both grapplers exchanging holds at a fast tempo. Warren had an edge on experience, but the newcomer exhibited some clever mat work, and proved as elusive as he was powerful.

Ray Frisbie acted as peacemaker for the evening's performances. A good crowd saw the triple-event card, and went away satisfied with one of the best shows seen this season on the local arena.

When Bill Morgan, ex-University of Oregon football star, approached Gus Sonnenberg before the match hoping he would be recognized after a former meeting, he was immediately relieved with the ex-champion's prompt "Hello, Morgan." They had become acquainted when "Doc" Spears entertained Sonnenberg in Eugene three years ago.

Lillard announced today that the next card at the Armory will be staged Thursday, July 19, when he will attempt to bring belligerent Pete Belcastro back to the Medford mat after a tour of Washington cities, where reports show he is going over big. A reduction in admission prices will be effective for this card, Lillard stated.

SEVEN-DAY SEASON AUTHORIZED ON ELK

PORTLAND, Ore., July 10.—(UP)—The state game commission today authorized an open season of seven days on elk for this fall, dates being Nov. 8 to 14 inclusive, following close of the deer season.

Area where elk killing will be permitted are in Wallawa, Baker, Union, Umatilla and Grant counties, where overgrazing is reported by the national forest service. Bag limit will be one elk with horns. No change was made in the deer season.

SPLIT SEASON OF PACIFIC LEAGUE PROVES PANACEA

(By the Associated Press.) Coast league moguls who split the 1934 season two weeks ago patting themselves on their respective backs today.

Club owners split the season because Los Angeles' overwhelming lead—18 1/2 games when the first half ended—made the race so one-sided the paying customers were staying away from the parks in alarming numbers.

Now, after two weeks of second half play, the Angels are in third place, Hollywood is in first, San Francisco in second and everybody happy, except perhaps the Los Angeles owners whose team apparently will have to put up a real battle to cop the second half crown.

The split season is paying dividends. Seattle, one of the poorest baseball cities in the circuit in the final weeks of the first half, is packing them in now. Ten thousand of the faithful turned out to see the Indians lick Los Angeles Friday, and nearly 11,000 paid to see the tribe split the Sunday double-header with the 1933 champions. Other cities reported appreciable gains in attendance.

A tightening of the pennant fight appeared likely this week as Los Angeles returned home for a series with the fast-moving Hollywood Stars and the second place Seals began a heavy-town engagement with the heavy-hitting Missions. Portland transferred its series with Seattle to the Puget Sound city.

ROAD TO SUMMIT MOUNT ASHLAND READY FOR CARS

ASHLAND, July 10.—(Sp.)—It is now possible to drive a car to the summit of Mount Ashland, and turn it around within 1200 feet of the peak.

The Mount Ashland forestry road which has been under construction since last October was completed Saturday and machinery was being moved out. The work has employed an average of 30 men over a period of six months. Work was started by the forest service on October 3, 1933, and with the exception of three months when bad weather prevented, work has continued to the present.

The forest road extends for 17 miles through beautiful forest country, previously accessible only by forest trails, and continues to a point one mile southwest of Mount Ashland, near the head of Grouse creek. The one-way branch road to the summit of Mount Ashland, 7395 feet above sea level, winds about the mountain one-half mile after leaving the main road. The drive from Ashland to the peak is 18 miles.
