## GERMANY CLAIMS ORCHESTRA HEAD DODGED HIS TAX

BERLIN, July 11.—(AP)—A warrant was issued today for the "temporary" arrest of Otto Klemperer, who has conducted various American orchestras, and is now in Vienna. Klemperer, a Jew, was former musical director-general of the state opera in Berlin. The warrant for his arrest was issued by the reich ministry of finance and was made public in the official gazette. It was also stated that the musician's property was to be confiscated. Klemperer, who left Germany early in 1933, was accused of tax evasion. It was said he owed the reich treasury a tax payment "amounting roughly to 4550 marks (\$1820) plus five per cent interest for every 14 days." The gazette warned Germans who were financially indebted to Klemperer not to repay their debts but to register them with the local tax office. Failure to do so would be punished, the announcement said, continuing: "Police, tax officials, customs officers and others are herewith authorized to take the above-named tax evader into temporary custody and surrender him to the state prosecutor should he be found in Germany."

## CUPID SPURRED BY PROSPERITY

NEW YORK, July 11.—(AP)—More people are getting married these days and it's an indication of improved economic conditions. This is a finding of the Metropolitan Life Insurance company's statistical bureau, after a survey in twenty-one states. "It would appear," the bureau reported, "that a sizeable proportion of the two million young men and women who postponed marriage during the difficult days of the depression are plucking up courage and getting married, as young people should." The marriage rate in the area surveyed increased 4.3 per cent in 1933 over 1932. Indications were that this increase continued in the early months of 1934.

## WRONG FIRE ALARM SOUNDED AT HOTEL

"In case of fire, break this glass" did not call the city fire department to the Lake Hotel last evening at 7:35, when fire broke out in the boiler room of the building on West Main street, and as a result, the fire was put out by a bucket brigade at the hotel. According to Fire Chief Roy Elliott, the manager of the hotel thought the alarm extended to the fire department, and for that reason did not put in an additional call until later. Chief Elliott said today that the alarm is only for persons in the hotel, and does not have outside connections.

## EVERETT HIGH SCHOOL DESTROYED BY BLAZE

EVERETT, July 11.—(AP)—The manual training and domestic science buildings of Arlington high school were destroyed by fire today, and the high school and several adjacent buildings, including some dwellings, were aflame. The fire quickly spread to other structures and was soon out of control. The two manual arts buildings were destroyed within half an hour and reports said the main high school building was burning fiercely and at that time was apparently doomed.

ASUNCION, Paraguay, July 11.—(AP)—Advices from the Chaco front today said the death struggle over Fort Ballivian was proceeding, with Paraguayan forces gradually approaching the stronghold. Fort Ballivian, held by the Bolivians, is the best entrenched fort in the Chaco area. It is equipped with the most modern guns and the most efficient means of defense, based on German strategy.

## WESTERN LUMBER CONSUMPTION TO HAVE STIMULANT

WASHINGTON, July 11.—(AP)—Stimulation of the lumber industry of the far west to such an extent that consumption in 1934 will be at least 145 per cent of that for 1933 was predicted today. After pointing out that present consumption of lumber was proceeding at a rate which probably would mean a total of 17,500,000,000 feet for 1934, Dr. William Compton, general manager of the National Lumber Manufacturers' association, said that under the administration housing program, "with proper corollary activity on the part of the industries themselves," consumption could be increased to a total of at least 25,000,000,000 feet next year. Such an increase would mean a net gain of approximately 43 per cent above 1933. Allocation of production for the west coast division this year has given Douglas fir 1,450,000,000 feet for the first quarter, 1,285,000,000 feet for the second, and 1,100,000,000 feet for the third—a total of 3,835,000,000 feet for the first nine months of the year, or a monthly average of a little more than 427,222,000 feet. Production allocation for western pine was 740,000,000 feet each for the first and second quarters and 633,000,000 feet for the third, a nine months' total of 2,113,000,000 feet or a monthly average of more than 234,777,000 feet.
