

# COWGILL, SIMPSON REPRIMANDED BY GAME COMMISSION

### Chairman Rakes Engineer and Farm Superintendent Over Coals for Purchases—Explanations Are Made

PORTLAND, July 11.—(AP)—Disorder broke in the ranks of the state game commission at the afternoon session here Tuesday as critical inquiries were directed at Ralph F. Cowgill, engineer for the commission, and Gene Simpson, superintendent of the commission's farms. Matt F. Corrigan, chairman of the game commission, reprimanded both.

Cowgill was criticized for the purchase of reputedly inefficient incubators for the state farms, and Simpson was accused of having purchased grain and mash of poor quality and without having obtained executive board approval for any purchase.

Foreman Complains. George Wells, foreman of the Pendleton game farm, declared the new incubators were "junk" and "the cheapest ever bought." Chairman Corrigan said the grain, purchased through the state board of control, was "about 50 or 75 per cent chaff," and that it did not conform with samples.

"I don't like these changes by subordinates, and I question the right of any employe to take authority into his own hands," Corrigan declared.

Cowgill said haste in purchasing the incubators had been dictated by the PWA and Emergency Relief Administration programs.

Cowgill Explains. He said purchase of the incubators was questioned by "competent authorities," and added "and it will be on my head if they don't work. . . . I'm not so sure they aren't all right." He reminded the chairman that the Corvallis game farm was moved abruptly and that "the whole thing was hauled to Eugene and dumped there with no one to care for it."

Simpson said the feed rations he purchased as "the finest of any game farm in America." He said the Oregon state college experiment with the feed showed an improvement of 232 per cent over birds fed any other type of feed.
