

# MELON, TOMATO MARKETING PACT STARTS JULY 14

### Agreement Designed To Inure Profit For Growers Without Boosting Prices Charged to Consumers.

PORTLAND, Ore., July 12.—(AP)—A marketing agreement for the melon and tomato crops of Oregon and Washington, designed to insure a profit for the growers without raising the price to the consumers will become effective July 14 throughout the two states. Harry G. Hawkins, formerly of Yakima, has been named general manager of the growers' association.

Details of the arrangement were revealed here today by Morton Tompkins of Dayton, Ore., and C. Wesley Williams of Roseburg. Prices scheduled. A minimum price schedule to retailers has been established, and penalties have been set for any grower who breaks the agreement, which was drawn under the approval of the directors of agriculture for Oregon and Washington. The organization was formed under enabling acts passed by the legislatures of the two states.

This agreement "has been rendered necessary," Williams said, "because of disastrous conditions within the industry during the past several years, which have brought the growers to virtual bankruptcy and disrupted the orderly channels of buying and selling to such an extent that jobbers and retailers were afraid to adequately supply their trade because of price uncertainty."

Dealers Enthusiastic Tompkins said dealers have endorsed the movement enthusiastically and that all large growers are cooperating.

The minimum price schedule to retailers follows: cantaloupe, jumbo crate, \$1.60; standard crate \$1.25; standard crate size 16, \$1.20; larger, \$1; standard flat crate, 65¢; per ton, \$40. Casaba, standard crate, \$1; per ton, \$30; honey dews and all other melons, standard crate, \$1; flat, 50¢; per ton, \$30; watermelons, per ton, \$25. The price on tomatoes is 20-lb box, 50¢; "L. A." lug, 75¢; apple boxes 75¢.

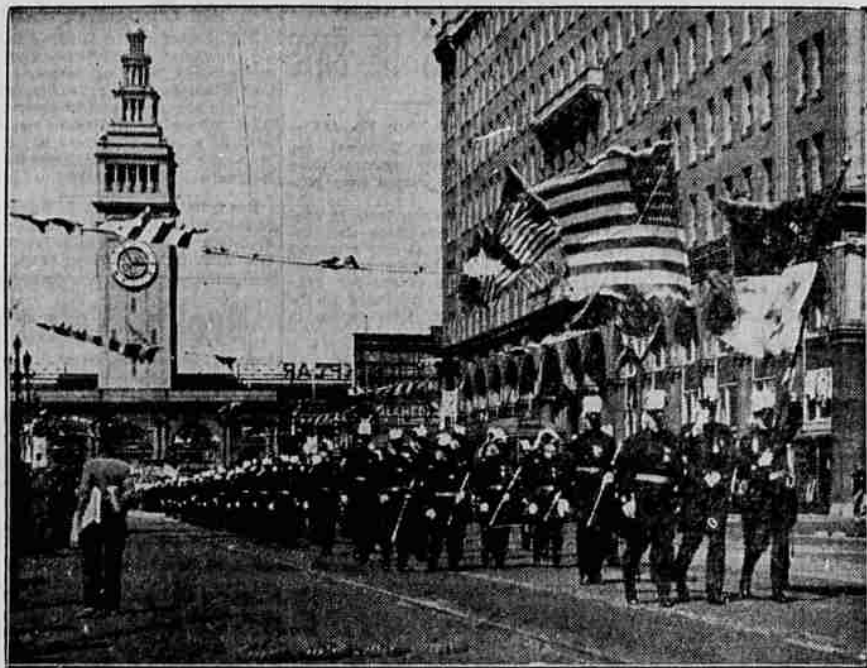
A system of "tax" stamps with which to provide funds for administering the marketing agreement has been worked out. All melon and tomato packages must carry these cancelled stamps in the following amount: cantaloupes, all jumbo and standard packages, 7¢; all flats, 3¢; per ton, 8¢; all other melons, including watermelons, per ton, 2¢; minimum tax for any small sale, 10¢. The rate for tomatoes: peach box, 3¢; "L. A." lug, 4½¢; apple boxes, 5¢. Stamps may be purchased in all districts at established points throughout the season.

Discounts Arranged Discounts to shippers and jobbers and case buyers and truck peddlers have been arranged. Fifteen per cent of the minimum price, plus common carrier rates from origin to the destination, may be deducted on purchases direct from grower or from the point of origin shipper. An allowance of 7¢ per standard crate on cantaloupes and other melons, 3¢ on tomatoes, and 2¢ per ton on all bulk commodities may be deducted by warehouses at the point of origin.

The agreement instructs that no product covered within its terms may be offered to the retailer unless it bears the proper stamps. Consignments are forbidden except on mutually satisfactory arrangements are made between the consignor and the consignee previously, and a maximum of ten days notice of the agreement is given the manager.

PORTLAND, July 12.—(UP)—They "shall not pass" if members of the Portland Presbytery have anything to say about a proposed nudist parade to be slated soon near Estacada. It was decided in a session today.

## VIRUS OF MUMPS PROMISES TO END CHILDREN'S WOES

NASHVILLE, Tenn.—(UP)—Johnny Schoolboy was promised relief today from the scourge of childhood—mumps.

The youngest of the younger generation soon will laugh heartily when their parents tell of their childhood woes involving days spent in nursing painfully swollen jaws.

Johnny will be able to laugh because he will have been vaccinated for mumps along with his smallest, typhoid fever and other standard inoculations.

Two medical experimenters at Vanderbilt university reported discovery of the virus that causes the disease of mumps. The scientists—Dr. Claud D. Johnson and Dr. Ernest W. Goodpasture—after working for more than a year on monkeys, ascertained that a swelling of the animal's parotid glands (jaws) invariably followed inoculation with saliva from human beings suffering with mumps.

"The experimental disease can be produced at will," Dr. Johnson stated, "and it is judged that this virus, which does not correspond with any known virus familiar to us, is the causative agent of mumps."

The doctors continue their experiments with the newly discovered virus and expect shortly to develop an immunizing agent and a serum for treatment of the disease. Previously, medical authorities were divided on the cause of mumps. Opinions varied with bacteria, a filterable virus and spirochete advanced most popularly as causative agents.

## BANK SHAREHOLDERS TO PAY ASSESSMENT

PENDLETON, July 12.—(P)—An assessment of 100 per cent has been levied by the comptroller of currency on shareholders of the closed First Inland National bank of Pendleton. It was announced here today. The bank has been closed since October, 1932. Capital stock was \$400,000. The first payment on the assessment is due August 10, and the last on November 10.

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## OUTER STAR RIM IS REVEALED BY HUGE TELESCOPE

### Described By Carnegie Institution Observatory Scientist As 'Swarm of Bees Drifting Through Air'

WASHINGTON.—(UP)—Dr. Edwin Hubble, astronomer of the Carnegie Institution's Mount Wilson Observatory, believes he has obtained a sample of the universe which lies beyond the reach of present-day scientific instruments.

For several years Dr. Hubble has been focusing a 100-inch telescope on the realms of the nebulae-systems of stars described as "swarms of bees drifting through the air" far beyond the outermost limits of the system embracing our sun and planets.

Although the nebulae nearest the earth are large and bright, the astronomer disclosed the majority are so distant that through a telescope they appear faint patches of misty, vaporous light.

This is the frontier of the known universe—the frontier which bounds a vast sphere, 600,000,000 million light years in diameter, throughout which are scattered 100,000,000 nebulae.

## MACHINE WIZARD AT MATHEMATICS

PHILADELPHIA, Pa.—(UP) A machine which, when completed, will weigh more than three tons and will think faster than the human brain, is being built in the Moore School of Engineering at the University of Pennsylvania here.

It is called a differential analyzer and is the second of its kind in the world. The first was constructed several years ago at the Massachusetts Institute of Technology.

The new machine, however, will be bigger than its predecessor, having a length of 26 feet and a width of 10 feet. Work on the machine was made possible by a portion of the GWA

funds which were distributed in this district. According to engineers, the differential analyzer can do in 15 minutes the work which would take a dozen expert mathematicians a week to complete. While the machine can be used in all branches of engineering, it will especially aid in calculating firing ranges by the army and navy.

Mouse Built Typewriter Home WICHITA, Kan.—(UP)—Vernon Smith, employed by a typewriter company here, is telling his friends of a mouse which built a nest inside a machine and reared its young undisturbed until the size of the constantly growing nest interfered with the operation of the machine and led to discovery.
