Examinations are open until July 24 for the position of junior agricul-tural statistician, Bureau of Agricul-ture Economics, Department of Agri-culture, with selary at \$2000 to \$2500

culture, with salary at \$2000 to \$2500 a year, and associate veterinarian (diseases affecting wild animal life), with salary at \$2500 a year, Bureau of Biological Survey. Specified education and experience are required for both these positions.

The position of junior legal assistant (labor law) is also open for examination until July 30. The salary is \$2000 a year, and a college or law school education, including labor law and allied subjects, is required by the Bureau of Labor Statistics. A further deduction of \$1\style percent will also be made toward a retirement annuity.
