NO BLAME FOUND IN FATAL CRASH

After deliberating for 20 minutes, the coroner's jury investigating the death of Mrs. E. A. Lampman, 73, yesterday afternoon returned a verdict in which they held no one to blame. Mrs. Lampman was fatally injured in an automobile crash on the Crater Lake highway Tuesday afternoon.

Only four witnesses were heard by the jury. They were Dr. C. I. Drummond, who performed the autopsy; Myron McEwen, driver of the logging truck which collided with the Lampman car; Harry Minto, state police officer who investigated the crash; and E. A. Lampman, her husband, who is in the community hospital receiving treatment for injuries suffered in the accident.

The inquest was in charge of District Attorney George Coddling and Coroner Frank Perl. Members of the jury were Harvey Field, Max Plover, Chet Leonard, Paul Martin, Vic Beckman and H. F. Barrett.

BARTLETT PICKING STARTING MIDDLE OF COMING WEEK

Picking of Rogue River Bartlett for eastern shipment is scheduled to start by the middle of next week, according to County Horticulturist Leje P. Wilcox. Picking of Bartlett for cannery use is scheduled to start the week of Monday, July 23.

Testing of the pears has started by the county horticulturist, who reports the Bartletts of good quality and excellent condition. Guy W. Conner estimates that 10,000 tons of the estimated cannery tonnage of 13,500 tons in this section has been sold at the prevailing price of \$32.50 to \$35 per ton. He reported sales yesterday at \$35 per ton for 2 1/2 sizes and better, a figure heretofore offered for 2 1/2 sizes.

It is forecast that the cannery Bartletts will be largely sold within the week. Packing plants of the city and valley have been put in shape for the coming season. The Pinnacle Packing plant will start a sorters' school Monday, under direction of Clarence Pankey, Frank Isaacs and Manuel Leadman. The classes will be held in the Pinnacle No. 3 plant, and are scheduled to start Monday morning. All former employees are asked to report.

Reports from California indicate that while the "crop is less than last year there are more of the better grade pears." This condition prevails in Mendocino county.

Packers and orchardists have announced they will employ all local help, and that there is plenty of home labor to handle the work. There has been some influx of transient labor, but not as heavy as in previous years.

RURAL MAIL CARRIER EXAMINATION SLATED FOR MEDFORD ROUTE

The United States civil service commission has announced an examination to fill the position of rural carrier at Medford.

The examination will be held at Ashland, and receipt of application will close on July 27, 1934. The date of examination will be stated on admission cards mailed to applicants after the close of receipt of applications, and will be about 10 days after that date. The salary of rural carrier on a standard route is \$1,800 per annum, with an additional \$30 per mile per annum for

each mile or major fraction thereof in excess of 24 miles. Certain allowances are also made for the maintenance of equipment.

The examination will be open only to citizens who are actually domiciled in the territory of the Medford postoffice, who have been actually domiciled there for six months next preceding the closing date for receipt of applications, and who meet the other requirements set forth in form 1977. Both men and women, if qualified, may enter this examination, but appointing officers have the legal right to specify the sex desired in requesting certification of eligibles. Form 1977 and application blanks can be obtained from the Medford postoffice or from the United States Civil Service Commission at Washington, D. C. Applications must be on file with the commission at Washington, D. C. prior to the close of business on the date specified above. At the examination, applicants must furnish unmounted photographs of themselves, taken within two years.

RURAL TELEPHONE BATTLE FINDS WAY TO JUSTICE COURT

An action alleging trespass, filed by Hamilton H. Fox against Reed Charley as a director of the Little Butte Telephone Users' association, awaits a hearing in justice court. There has been legal maneuvering back and forth for two weeks.

The situation is highly involved, and concerns orders by the public utility commission of Oregon, the absorption of the country phone line by the Columbia River Public Utilities corporation, change in the by-laws and constitution of the Little Butte Telephone Users' association, directors' meetings, the allegation that Mr. Fox did not pay his telephone bill, and the alleged cutting of the wires of the Fox phone.

The legality of one of the meetings of the telephone users is also under fire. The public utility commission orders were approved by a 31-to-4 vote—Fox and three others voting against it, it is alleged. Fox now

FREAK ALFALFA HAS LONG ROOTS

MORGANTOWN, W. Va. (UP)—A freak variety of alfalfa, found on the farm of Charles O. Ashton, near Moundville, is being studied here by Russell R. Gist of the University of West Virginia. The unusual plant sends down a root farther than other varieties and

each stalk has its own roots. The Ashton plant has one main root, plus an extensive root system from which 308 stalks were growing. As alfalfa enriches soil by charging it with nitrogen nodules, gleaned from the air, Ashton believes such a spreading root system would aid greatly in soil upbuilding.

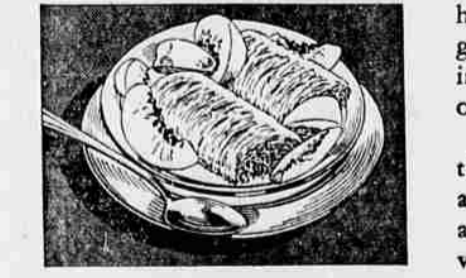
