

# ROGUES DEFEATED, 9-4, BY EWAUNA'S HEAVY STICK WORK

### Klamath Second Baseman Has Perfect Day With Homer, Two Doubles and Two Singles in 5 Times Up

Medford's golden opportunity to gain a full game on the league-leading Grants PAM Merchants, who lost a Shaw-Bertram in a starting upset, went for naught yesterday at Klamath Falls when Ewauna's paces by Bernie Bernadou, beat the Rogues, 9-4. Bernadou, in blasting out five hits in five trips to the plate, enjoyed the only perfect day at bat of any Southern Oregon league player this year, and provided the necessary punch to give Medford their second straight beating. In addition, the heavy hitting second sacker drove in five with his home-run, two doubles and two singles.

Jack Hughes went the route for Medford and was touched for 19 hits, while Clyde Carlstrom was forced to finish on the mound for Ewauna after Jack Andrews was battered from the box in the third inning after Paul Hoffer tripled to right to score Swanson and Joy.

From the non Carlstrom held the Rogues completely at bay except in the fifth, when singles by Haight, Hulen and Sargent accounted for the final Medford tally.

Ewauna's initial run came in the first when Wheeler parked one of Hughes' fast balls for a homer. Four more crossed the plate in the fourth on Kiger's single, Haight's error on an attempted double play, Martin's single, Bernadou's home-run, Carlstrom's single and Wilson's double.

Another was added in the fifth by the winners, on Martin's single and Bernadou's two-bagger, and the final three came in the seventh on Martin's single, Bernadou's double, a walk and Putnam's single.

Bill Hammerley, Gold Hill boy recently signed by the Miners, experienced some difficulty in getting the upper hand over his former playmate, surrendering 10 hits in the first four innings. From then on, however, Hammerley held his townsmen at bay. Gardner, for Gold Hill, featured the afternoon with a home-run with two aboard, and collecting two angles to complete his bit in five chances. Coy and L. Foley also took a trio of clouts, with Coy poling out a triple.

## DETROIT TIGERS GAIN TOP OF LEAGUE WITH VICTORY OVER YANKS

The Detroit Tigers were resting today if not on top of the world, at least on top of the American league, where they welcomed their first chance to draw a deep, quiet breath after battling their way up past the New York Yankees.

The Tigers wound up their campaign against the Yanks with a smashing 8 to 3 triumph yesterday which brought them three victories for the four-game series. Meanwhile the New York Giants, engaged in a similar important series with the second place Chicago Cubs, increased their lead to two full games with a 5 to 3 victory, but they still had three games to go to the decision. Schoolboy Rowe, who won the first game of the series for Detroit, again aided the Tiger cause as 26,000 fans looked on. He worked six innings, gave eight hits, fanned six and kept all the Yanks but Lou Gehrig under control. Gehrig, celebrating his return to full-time duty after an attack of lumbago that threatened his record consecutive game streak, racked four straight hits.

The Giants had a somewhat tougher time and finally had to call in Carl Hubbell to replace Hal Schumacher and protect the slim lead Mel Ott had given them when he smashed a double with two aboard in the sixth.

# KAYE DON GIVEN 4 MONTHS' TERM FOR AIDE'S DEATH

DOUGLAS, Mo. July 16.—(AP)—Kaye Don, noted auto racing driver, was sentenced to four months' imprisonment today following his conviction of manslaughter in the death of his mechanic in a wreck May 28.

The sentence will be served in New Douglas prison.  
Francis Taylor, the mechanic, was killed instantly on a night practice run for a local race when the automobile catapulted off the highway on a bad turn. Don himself was seriously injured.

The automobile and speed boat racer was convicted Saturday night. Immediately upon sentence today Don's attorney filed notice of appeal.

The prosecution charged Don failed to slacken speed when rounding a dangerous curve, endangering both his and Taylor's life. The speed king pleaded not guilty.  
Don became well known in the United States for his efforts to wrest the Harnsworth speed boat trophy from Gar Wood of Detroit in 1931 and 1932. He failed, but has set numerous automobile and boat speed records.  
Don's application for leave to appeal was granted at a private afternoon session and the racer was allowed bail, permitting him to leave the Isle of Man if he desires, pending the hearing of the appeal.

## Baer Don't Choose To Defend Heavy Crown This Fall

NEW YORK, July 16.—(AP)—Max Baer, through his manager, Anell Hoffman, today notified Madison Square Garden that he chose not to defend his heavyweight title this fall.  
Colonel John Reed Kilpatrick, in announcing receipt of the message, said he would have something to say later as to the Garden's plans. It was expected he would announce a series of elimination contests among would-be challengers, including Carnera, for the fall and winter, to select an opponent for Baer next June.
