Life of Average Book Over Four Years Is Word of School Librarian — Repaired, Cleaned in Spring

During the past year, approximately 13,000 textbooks have been loaned free of charge to Medford elementary and junior high pupils...

These books are in almost constant use. A textbook during its life can be used by from 4 to 12 pupils according to the length of time a child needs the book...

These library books can be repaired at the rate of about three an hour, and such reconditioning doubles the life of the book...

HENRY VINSON, 83, PIONEER RESIDENT CALLED BY DEATH

Henry Vinson, resident of Medford for the past 30 years, passed away at his residence, 144 North Riverside, Monday at noon...

At the age of five, he left Missouri in 1855, with his parents, and crossed the plains by covered wagon and ox-team...

In a day's travel from this locality the party came to a spot where a wagon train had been attacked by the Indians...

After spending some time in the Willamette valley, the train continued to Jackson county in 1858, where Mr. Vinson's father mined extensively at Jacksonville in the early days...

The deceased went to Klamath county in 1869, and was there during the Modoc war, assisting in the capture of Black Jim...

Mr. Vinson was engaged in cattle and horse raising for many years, and was one of the most prominent stock raisers in Klamath county...

Mr. Vinson was a noble character, a Christian at heart, always had a good word for everyone, and was willing at all times to lend a helping hand...

He is survived by his widow, Elmira Vinson; two daughters, Annie of Medford, and Mrs. Stanley Vaughn of Table Rock...

Funeral services will be held at the First Funeral Home Wednesday at 3 p. m., Reverend D. E. Millard officiating...

fronts" and heavily guarded machines began to bring food supplies to a population of 1,300,000 persons.

As the east bay strike became effective, Mayor William F. Murray of Alameda issued a proclamation declaring he would control the situation.

S. F. Boats Serve The crews of key system ferryboats and trains joined the strike, leaving thousands of commuters to crowd like sardines into the Southern Pacific boats and cars.

An almost ominous calm hung over San Francisco's streets when municipal street cars resumed their interrupted service.

Meanwhile civic and military forces pressed forward in their plans to rush supplies through picket lines in outlying districts.

General Hugh Johnson, NRA administrator, was expected to confer with President Roosevelt's labor disputes board in further attempts to bring about arbitration.

Mayor Angelo Rossi and his committee of 500 citizens were perfecting plans to distribute foodstuffs.

National guardsmen hastily erected barricades throughout the commission district here to furnish protection for trucks bearing vegetables and other produce.

Union executive committee members convened and took up the question of issuing more permits for restaurants to operate here and feed thousands of persons who were unable to get their meals at the 19 official cafes.

Steps to prevent violence in the east bay were taken when the strike spread from there. This date and during the continuance of the emergency, the city of Alameda shall be governed by me by proclamation," declared Mayor Murray of Alameda.

It was not revealed whether the president, vacationing in Hawaii, had replied to the message, nor was the substance of the governor's message revealed.
