

COWGILL OPPOSED TO HYDRAULIC FISH LIFT AT BONNEVILLE DAM

PORTLAND, July 18.—(AP)—Hydraulic fish lifts such as have been proposed for the Bonneville dam by the United States bureau of fisheries, do not meet with the favor of Oregon experts who are opposed to any "experimental" fish migration plan.

Ralph Cowgill, game department engineer, is "unilaterally opposed" to the hydraulic lifts, he said, while Chester E. McCarty, representing sportsmen, declared installation of such lifts would constitute "a dangerous experiment with an invaluable industry."

The gravity system of highways is suggested by Oregon game department leaders.

McCarty mentioned that "the Columbia river salmon industry employs something like 54,000 people and supplies the states of Washington, Idaho and Oregon with millions of dollars of revenue every year," and that under no circumstances can this industry be imperiled.

CANNOT DEPORT STRIKE LEADER

WASHINGTON, July 18.—(AP)—Labor department officials said today Harry Bridges, one of the San Francisco strike leaders, was an alien but that he had entered the country unlawfully in 1920.

Bridges, a native of Australia, was admitted at San Francisco. He filed a declaration of intention to become a citizen at New Orleans on July 13, 1921, and asked for final papers in 1922. He had waited more than the prescribed five years, however, and could not be naturalized. He took out first papers again in August, 1928 but again let five years go by without seeking citizenship.

Officials said there was nothing in his record, apparently, to warrant deportation proceedings and that he could not be summarily sent out of the country since he entered before 1924.

OREGON GRANTED \$695,700 RELIEF

WASHINGTON, July 18.—(AP)—Grants of relief funds to nine western states and Hawaii totaling \$10,801,080 were announced today by Aubrey Williams, acting federal emergency administrator.

The money for July needs will go to the following: Oregon—\$600,700, including \$75,000 for drought relief, \$19,000 for transient relief and \$1700 for relief research. Idaho—\$420,000 including \$250,000 for drought relief and \$60,000 for transient relief.

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Bears Kill Keeper Who Turned Hose in Denver City Zoo Pen

DENVER, July 18.—(AP)—Two hungry grizzly bears, irked by unusual heat, attacked and killed their keeper, Charles E. Wyman, today and threw the whole Denver Zoo into turmoil.

Guards raced to Wyman's aid in the natural habitat pen of the big bears, and shot and killed the two grizzlies, but the veteran keeper already was dead.

He had entered the cage to clean it and to cool it off with water. He played a hose over the concrete floor of the enclosure and it was believed he accidentally turned the water upon one of the bears, Lady Yellowstone, who was brought here 20 years ago from Yellowstone park, as a cub.

With a roar, the grizzly was on him. Wyman turned the full force of the hose in the face of the bear, attempting to blind it, but it only enraged the animal. Lady Yellowstone's mate, Teddy, plunged into the struggle and the two bears quickly mauled the keeper.
