

SCENIC LOOP TRIP PROVING POPULAR AMONG TOURISTS

OREGON CAVES NATIONAL MONUMENT, Ore.—(Special.) Will travel steadily increasing to the Oregon Caves and the great bulk of visitors, next to Oregon, arriving from California, loop trips are popular with motorists this season, usually bringing them to the caves, Crater Lake and other scenic attractions, comments by visitors have revealed.

The route often follows the Redwood highway to this resort, Grants Pass, the Pacific highway to Medford and then to Crater Lake. An interesting return trip leads through Klamath Falls, a side trip to the Modoc Lava Beds National monument, a visit at Lassen Volcanic National park and a choice of routes to home destinations in California.

The journey up the Redwood highway from San Francisco and other bay section points takes the motorist through some of the finest stands of redwoods in existence, presenting a picture no traveler can easily forget. Many acres of big trees have been purchased and set aside as state parks by the state of California. The Save-The-Redwoods league of California, composed of the most prominent citizens of the state, has been largely responsible for their creation.

A traveler in a redwood grove is akin to a person in a new world, reminding of the portals of a cathedral, dim, lofty, pillared and peaceful. This temple, so patiently brought about through the passage of many centuries, is compared as nobler, more beautiful and more serene than any erected by the hands of man. Lotlier than Amiens, its red-tinted shafts, reaching toward the heavens over 200 feet, are more numerous than the pillars of Cordova.

The floor of the land of big trees, with their green and brown carpetings, are declared more intricate than those of St. Marks and forest aisles are illuminated with a light of greater beauty than that which filters through the stained glass of Chartres. These inspiring scenes can be viewed in leisurely driving en route to the Oregon Caves, descriptions of which challenge spoken or written words.

SALEM CITY WATER GRADE A IS CLAIM

SALEM, July 19.—(P)—Following an examination today of the Salem water supply, the state board of health pronounced the water grade A, or first-class for human use. The examination was made by Carl E. Green, sanitary inspector for the board, and J. E. Blinnhorn of the Marion county health board.

The request for examination came from Charles S. Thomas, public utilities commissioner, after he had received a complaint from K. O. Thomason, local lawyer, that the water was "unfit for drinking purposes."

SEATTLE INDUSTRIAL PLANT IS DESTROYED

SEATTLE, Wash., July 19.—(P)—A three-alarm fire of mysterious origin last night destroyed the plant of the Ehrlich-Harrison Hardwood company in the south end industrial section, with a loss estimated by fire officials at more than \$50,000.

Fire Captain W. W. McIntosh said the fire was burning in several separate places when his outfits arrived.

LA GRANDE HOST FOR CELEBRATION RAIL ANNIVERSARY

LA GRANDE, Ore., July 19.—(P)—A three-day festival program in honor of the Union Pacific's semi-centennial in eastern Oregon began to unfold here this morning with the opening of events of a railroad jubilee that is expected to attract thousands of people to LaGrande.

The initial event was the arrival here of a replica of the first train that entered LaGrande in 1884, bearing as its passengers some of the oldest settlers and veteran railroad men of this section. Following this the impromptu celebration of half a century ago will be re-enacted and then a pioneer parade held, preceding an all-day annual pioneer picnic and LaGrande home-coming at Riverdale park.

The coronation of Queen Page with ceremonies in which 200 LaGrande children will take part is scheduled for Thursday night at the stadium, under floodlights. The Odgen, Utah, U. P. band, which will play at the coronation, arrived here today.

The celebration parade will be Friday morning, a downtown Mardi Gras in the afternoon and the Northwest drum corps contest in the evening. Saturday events include an historical pageant in the afternoon and a wrestling-boxing card at night. Golf, tennis, horseshoe tournaments and a rodeo will be held daily, with trap shooting Friday and a baseball game between LaGrande and the Mission Indians Saturday.

RETAIL FOOD UP SLIGHTLY IN JULY

WASHINGTON, July 19.—(P)—The labor department today reported a slight increase in retail food prices during the two weeks ended July 1.

The department's index number for the two weeks was 109.6 as compared with 109.1 the previous two weeks. One hundred represents prices in 1913.

Of 42 articles included in the survey, 18 went up, 8 dropped and 16 did not change. Among items increasing were pork chops, bacon, ham, eggs, steak, lard, oleomargarine, and sugar.

The index two years ago stood at 101.

LOCAL BOYS ACCEPTED BY NAVAL RECRUITERS START FIRST TRAINING

A. P. Walker, C. M. M., U. S. N., recruiting officer for this district, reports that Charles Ward and Donald Stinson of Medford and James T. Bush of Rogue River were accepted for enlistment at the main recruiting station, Portland, Ore., on July 17, and immediately transferred to the recruit training school at San Diego for preliminary training.

Ward is a well known local athlete and received his education at the Jacksonville high school. Stinson

completed his education at the Medford high school, where he distinguished himself as an athlete and a leader in school affairs. Bush is a graduate of the Rogue River high school and a well known young man of that community.

All these boys were selected from a large list of applicants because of the high marks attained in their mental, moral and physical examinations. All three boys are interested in steam and Diesel engineering and intend to take up training in this profession after graduating from the recruit training school.
