

SOLDIERS MASSES NEAR CITY READY FOR QUICK DASH

On all our services will be resumed at all coast ports on Monday," Ship to Arrive.

Acting immediately on the basis that the port here will be opened, the American-Hawaiian Steamship company announced it will dispatch the steamer America to Portland from San Francisco tomorrow to load 12,000 tons of cargo for the east coast. The company said the vessel will discharge about 2000 tons here.

A minor blast was discharged shortly after midnight in the area in which the tie-loading operations were being conducted today. Police said probably not more than two sticks of dynamite were used. A hole eight feet long was torn in a board fence. The bombing was attributed to the labor strife.

PORTLAND, Ore., July 20. (AP)—Armed with bayonets, machine guns and light howitzers, National Guardsmen encamped a few miles from here today, ready to advance on the Portland waterfront if maritime pickets interfere with shippers' plans to open the strike-bound port.

Menaced by the guard mobilization, union labor poised its big stick by holding the menace of a general strike over the city and the waterfront.

Seven hundred guardsmen mobilized hastily, following orders issued last night by Governor Julius L. Meier, who said citizens of the state and shippers and producers of lumber and grain urged the action.

Say Promise Abrogated.

The Portland strike strategy committee said the order abrogates its promise that a general strike would be held in abeyance pending further negotiations. That was its understanding with Senator Robert F. Wagner of New York, administration emissary assisting in strike negotiations here.

Senator Wagner, who said he regretted Governor Meier felt it was necessary to call out the troops at this time, was assured by the strike committee that 24 hours' notice would be given if a general strike call is issued.

The troops, with shining bayonets and steel helmets were accompanied by a special gas company, ready to disperse any mobs with tear gas, demoralizing vomit gas and toxic gas. Automatic rifles were backed by light howitzers which shoot one-pound shells.

"You're not behind the plow. You're in the army now—"

Bugles sounded the call in the speedy mobilization from Portland and other northwest Oregon towns last night.

Harbor Activity Limited.

Limited loading and unloading of general cargo has been carried on the past fortnight. At a municipal terminal here, heavily armed police and special guards held pickets at bay. However, pickets prevented movement of cargo to or from the terminal, if at severe cost.

Pickets faced two gas and night-club attacks by police, and four were wounded as police opened fire in a third unsuccessful attempt to escort a cargo laden train onto the terminal.

The Portland port has been closed tighter than any other major Pacific coast port since Pacific coast members of the International Longshoremen's association struck May 9. The longshoremen demanded union recognition, union control of hiring halls and adjustment of wages and hours.

Action Lauded.

Ship owners' Governor Meier's action in calling out troops they declared the complete tie-up of the port could not continue "forever."

A citizen, slow to realize full significance and seriousness of the Oregon National Guard's first mobilization in nearly 30 years, was arrested.

Harry S. Green, Portland contractor, disregarded orders to halt at a sentry line thrown about the Portland Army, where 800 troops doffed "civilian" and put on uniforms. Ordered to halt, Green was alleged to have told guardsmen the city was not under martial law and that they lacked police power.

His automobile plowed the first sentry line, but was halted at the next. He was charged with disorderly conduct.

Guardsmen Tense.

The guardsmen, some still growing boys in their beards, camouflaged tentacles with a veneer of banter, kidding, wise-cracking. Suppressed excitement needed some outlet.

Oil companies set an hour for simultaneous dispatch of police-protected gasoline trucks to send gasoline singing into empty service station tanks.

One or two policemen will be assigned to each truck.

A petroleum committee said Oregon and Washington farmers have been supplied with gasoline dispatched from refineries by rail.

If truck movement of gasoline from Port and waterfront supply bases is successful, rail distribution will follow, oil officials said. Vigorous picketing by striking seamen, who declared the companies "unfair," led to a complete shut-down of distribution here of gasoline for retail trade.

Gasoline for Fire.

With picket sanction and police protection the oil companies made gasoline available to a limited "emergency" list which included police, doctors, mail trucks and a few others.

Meanwhile, the general public went without, paid higher prices for limited amounts of "bootleg" gasoline or played the losing game of driving to nearby towns for supplies. One man was fined for storing 15 gallons within city limits. Doubtless others "got by" with it.

During the gasoline drought the waterfront supply bases held 18,000-20,000 gallons of gasoline, much of which was unloaded here by oil tankers moored by non-union crews.
