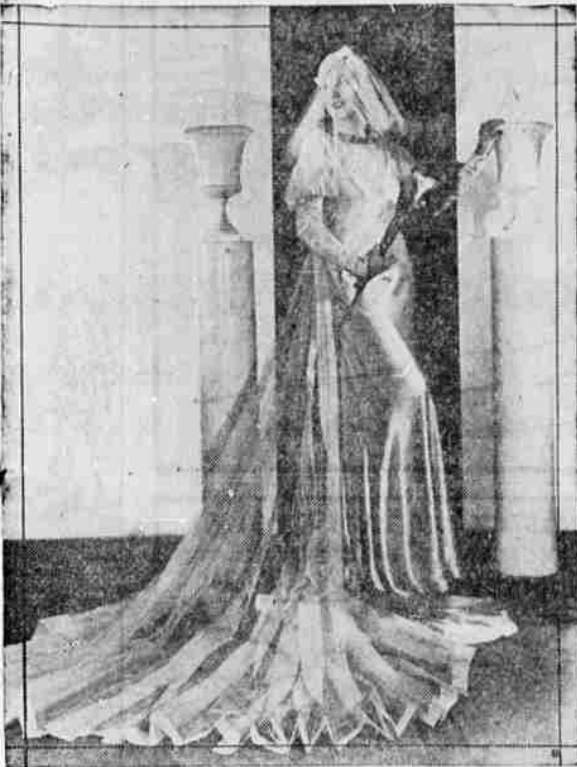


TWO VEILS FOR JUNE BRIDE

THEY FIGURE IN STRIKE THREATS



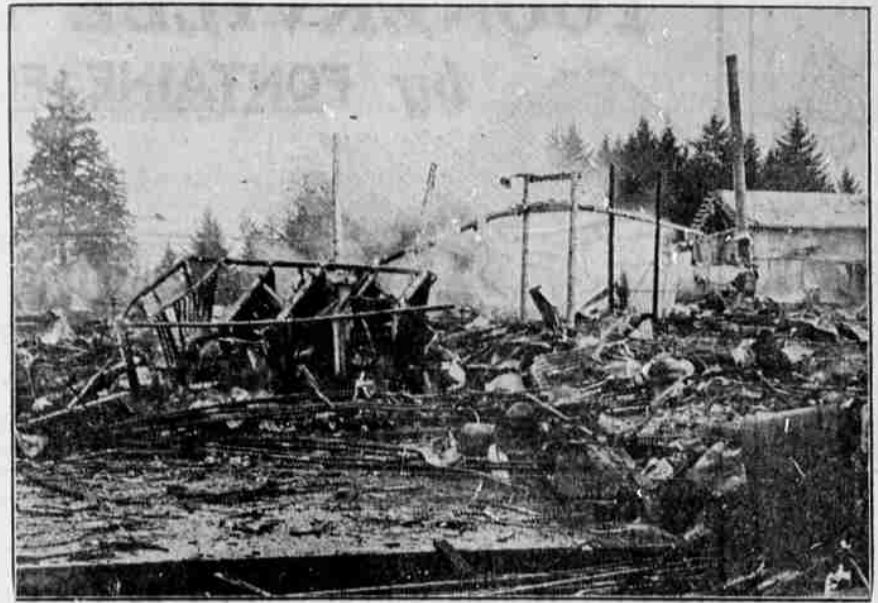

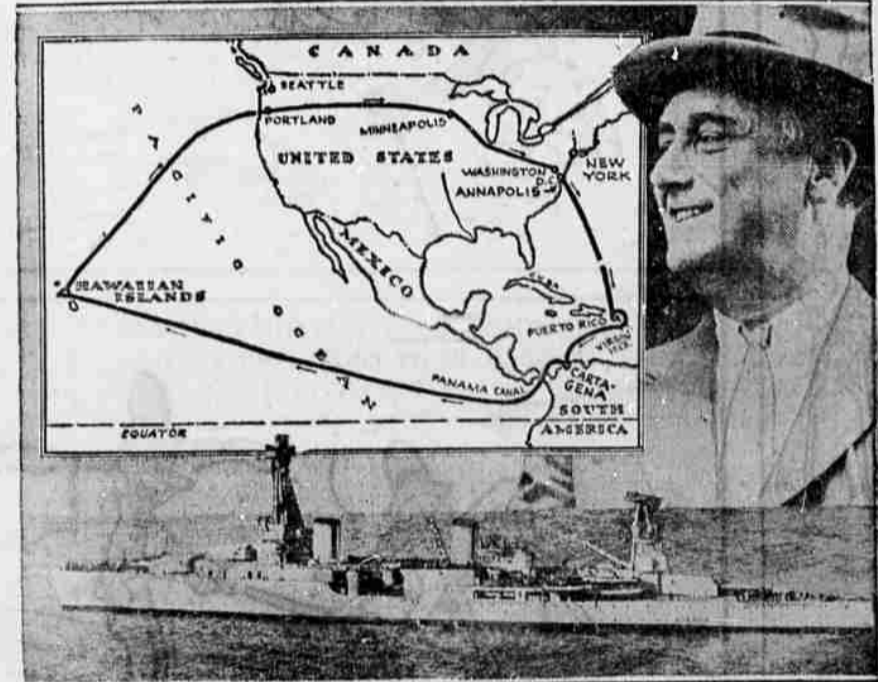

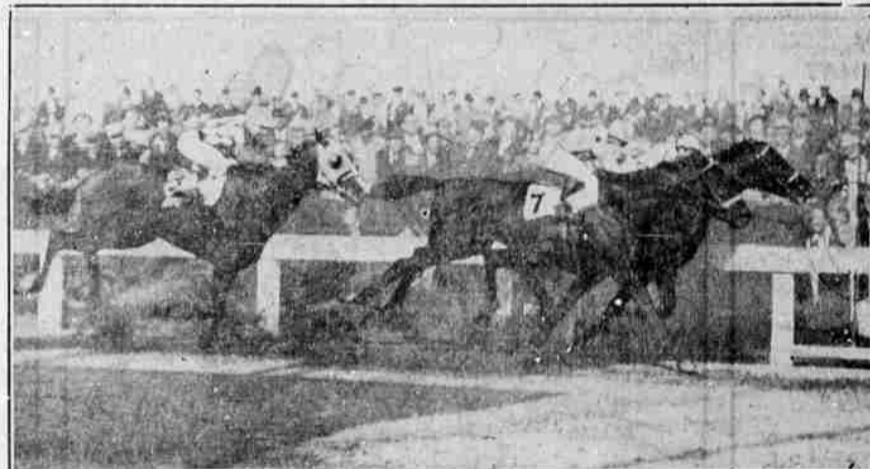

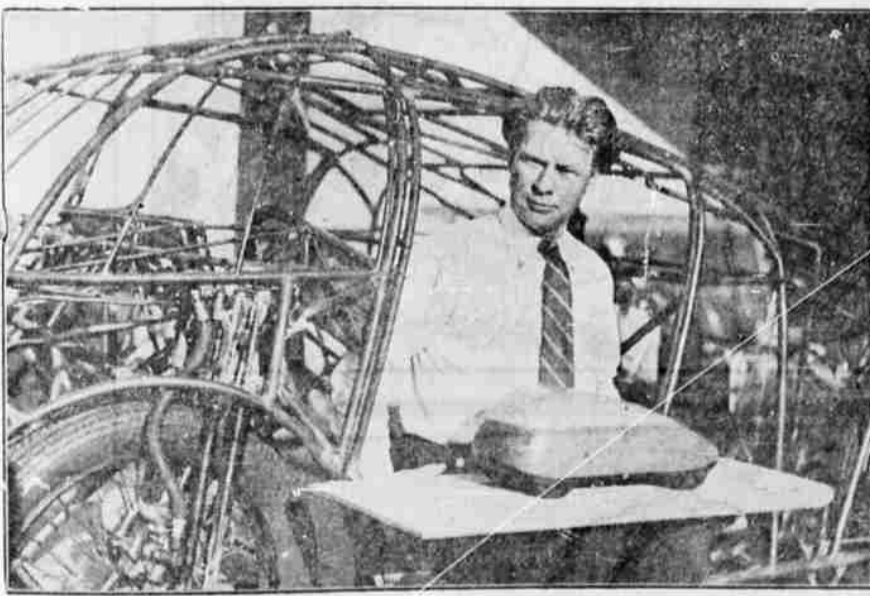

BIOLOGIST DESIGNS TEAR DROP AUTOMOBILE
