PAIR OF GARTERS SOUGHT BY LADY
LONDON, July 21. (AP)—Lady Houston, England's "lady beautiful," wants a new pair of garters—the ceremonial kind the British government gives famous men.

Writing in her magazine, the Saturday Review, today she said: "The death of the Duke of Wellington and the Duke of Marlborough have created an unexpected problem for filling the Order of the Garter."

"As one would be of no use to me, I modestly suggest that I be given them both."

Lady Houston became England's wealthiest woman when she inherited the \$35,000,000 estate of her late husband, Sir Robert Houston, the shipping magnate, several years ago. Her charitable gifts earned her the title of "Lady Bountiful."
