

Australian Davis Team Wins Singles Match From American Squad

DEFEAT DAMPENS YANKEE HOPES TO REGAIN NET TOGA

M'Grath Spills Advance Dope By Victory Over U. S. Ace—Lott Held Last Chance On Monday.

WIMBLEDON, Eng., July 21.—(AP)—Bringing across a tremendous wallop from an unexpected quarter, Australia's Davis cup team today captured both singles matches from the United States in the opening of their interzone series to deal what probably is a knockout blow to American hopes of regaining the famous international tennis trophy this year.

Vivian McGrath, curly haired, impetuous 21-year-old star from down under, knocked the advance dope in a cocked hat by humbling Sidney B. Wood, Jr., of Jack Sam's crew, 7-5, 6-4, 1-6, 9-7, after Uncle Crawford, the Aussies' top-ranking player, had scored an almost casual victory over Frank X. Shields, 6-1, 8-2, 12-10.

The double setback left Captain I. Norris (Dick) Williams disappointed an impossible task of looking like the remaining doubles match on Monday and the two singles on Tuesday, when Shields engages McGrath and Wood takes on Crawford.

The players themselves seem to feel that the task is too great.

"It's up to you, George, to get in there and win on Monday," a man told George M. Lott, Jr., as the players went to their dressing rooms.

Lott, who will pair with towering Lester Stouen against Crawford and Astar Quisen, replied in a somewhat downcast tone:

"Yes, but what's the use? It's the same old story."

Ken Williams will probably put his league-leading pitcher, Bill Nelson, on the mound for Grants Pass, while Al Droulette will work behind the bat.

Medford's Gilmore Lions will invade the Josephine county fair grounds today in a return game with the Grants Pass Stars, who are determined to even the count of an 8-6 defeat handed out on the local diamond last week.

Both teams are composed of former high school and college players and put up good exhibitions of ball, although the Gilmore nine has held the edge so far this season, sailing down last Sunday's encounter with the Stars in the first four innings.

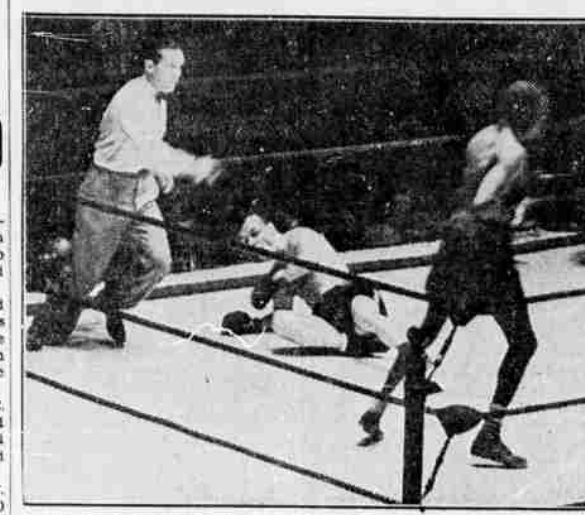

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PICKENS, SPORTS PROMOTER, BACKER OF FORD, IS DEAD

LOS ANGELES, July 21.—(AP)—William Hickman Pickens, whose promotion efforts sent a parade of famous figures from Henry Ford to Suzanne Lenglen across the international horizon for almost a score of years, was dead today.

Of blood poisoning, indirectly resulting from his last and perhaps financially most successful venture—the 400-mile road stock-car race here last winter—took his life yesterday.

Pickens' name was associated with many of the pioneers of automobile racing, balloon flying, airplane stunting, foot races and professional football and tennis. He was born in Birmingham, Ala., 60 years ago.

In the late thirties he started promoting bicycle races after beginning his career as a competitor in the sport. By 1900 he had jumped to horseless carriages and soon became associated with a daring young "speed maniac," Henry Ford, whose famous motor buggy "999" sputtered and backfired around many a fair grounds horse racing track.

As the industry grew other famous pilots raced under his wing and passed on to undying fame, including Eddie Rickenbacker, Louis Chevrolet and Barney Oldfield.

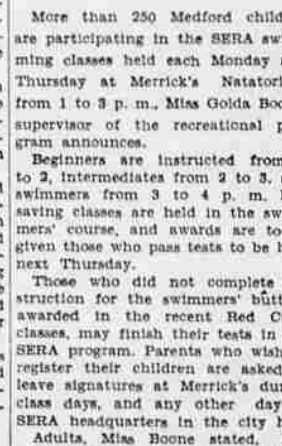
Jockey Breaks Neck Training Oregon Nag
