HOWELL RESIGNS AS PRESBYTERIAN PASTOR, OCT. 1ST

(By J. W. Angell) ALBANY, Ore., July 19.—(Special Correspondence to Mail Tribune)—Among business matters coming before the business session of the Presbytery of Southwest Oregon, held here Wednesday in connection with the Synod of Oregon, was the resignation of Rev. W. J. Howell as pastor of the Medford Presbyterian church. The resignation was accepted by the presbytery to take effect October 1.

Thursday, third day of the annual synod, was devoted to the work of the national missions, including Sunday school mission work, work among the Indians in Oregon and other business of a general nature. Only one death among the Presbyterian ministers of Oregon during the year was noted, that of Rev. Joseph A. McVeigh, last November. Rev. McVeigh was pastor of the Presbyterian church at Rogue River some fifteen years ago and later at Glendale. He died at his home in Rogue River.

Among those attending synod from Medford and southwest Oregon presbytery are: Rev. and Mrs. W. J. Howell, Rev. E. A. Oldenburg, Rev. E. Iverson, Dr. Charles T. Sweeney and H. F. W. Spilner of Medford; Rev. and Mrs. M. T. Edwards of Ashland; Rev. S. Peterson of Prineas; J. M. Johnson of Central Point, Theo. Robinson of Oakland, A. T. Smith of Klamath Falls, S. H. Jewell of Merrill, H. L. Weil of Malin, D. T. Robertson of Marshfield, J. W. Hood of Reedsport, J. W. Angell of Gold Beach and Elder E. L. Elliott of Klamath Falls.

Wednesday was foreign missions day with reports and addresses showing great encouragement and opportunity in the work over the world, notwithstanding the necessity of some retrenchment due to smaller contributions by the people of the churches during the hard times.

A great revival sweeping through China was noted, and widespread doors for Christian work in many countries, especially in Mexico, Colombia, China, etc.

Dr. Wm. F. Klein of New York, secretary of the department of evangelism, is speaking every evening in the Albany Presbyterian church on some phase of evangelism as the great work of the church, i. e., the winning of people to Christ as their personal Savior.

Airflow Car Sets A.A.A. Cross-Country Economy Record

An Airflow DeSoto Sedan, equipped with the new overdrive transmission, has established a transcontinental economy record in a scientific test run sanctioned by the American Automobile Association. The car averaged 21.42 miles to the gallon of gasoline on the 3,019-mile run. Three large corporations cooperated in sponsoring the test. NEW ENGLAND HAS SERIES OF FIRES

BOSTON, July 21.—(AP) Fire crept stealthily through miles of New England's fabled forests today and smoldered threateningly in the scrubland of her coastal plains.

Farmers, campers and CCC men, almost as blackened as the smoldering tree stumps, fought the devastating blazes with no hope of early aid from the elements.

The weather bureau at Boston forecast "no prospect of rain in central and southern New England during the next 48 hours."

A forest fire which started yesterday at Mooslamoo mountain, east of Lake Dunmore, in Vermont, was beyond control and was burning over a wooded area a mile square.

Flames licked at the borders of Battledore, a tract of first growth trees owned by Middlebury college.
