STUDIO THEATER NOW AIR COOLED
With the recent installation of a system of Airex fans, the Studio theatre, under the management of Walter Leverette, is as cool and comfortable a rendezvous for movie-goers as is available, according to Jack Wurts, manager of Wurts Gift Shop, who provided the equipment.
Water-cooled air, forced through vents in the floor, is circulated about the auditorium, and after accomplishing its cooling mission, is drawn out through a suction fan and replaced by fresh air from below.
Through air vents in the basement at the back of the building the air is first admitted. It is then drawn into a concrete washing compartment where it is thoroughly sprayed with ice-cold water, then blown by a giant fan through the floor vents, from which it is circulated by another fan system throughout the building.

Moving Theatre. Showing Untitled of Forthcoming Motion Pictures, Will Pass Through City Tomorrow



A giant "theatremobile" which will screen scenes from next season's Paramount pictures is scheduled to arrive in the city and give a free showing tomorrow. Built by Paramount Pictures at a cost of \$12,000, the huge machine is built on a chassis of a ten-ton truck. It requires the services of four men to operate it and the projection equipment inside.
A screen on the rear end permits visibility both day and night.
Among the films from which local residents will see scenes when the truck arrives here are: Bing Crosby in "She Loves Me Not," Marlene Dietrich in "The Scarlet Empress," Claudette Colbert in Cecil B. De Mille's "Cleopatra" and "Mrs. Wiggs of the Cabbage Patch."
The mobile show house is making a tour of the United States. It started from the Hollywood studios of Paramount, where H. E. Howard, the driver, entertained all of the film city's stars with screenings before his departure.
