

SUPREME COURT ISSUES RULINGS IN LOCAL CASES

Haines Loses Appeal Statutory Charge — Enyart Claim Remanded — Deny Niedermeyer Rehearing

The state supreme court today handed down rulings in three cases—one criminal, and two civil—having their origin in Jackson county.

The Haines, former Red Top district resident, serving three years in state prison for a statutory offense involving a 14 year old girl, lost his appeal to the supreme court. Haines, in prison since last October, must serve the balance of his term. The case created extreme interest in the Red Top district.

Enyart, taken by Attorney Rawley Moore, was based upon the grounds that Haines was rushed to trial without due notice, that prejudicial influences affected the verdict, and that the district attorney made prejudicial statements in his closing arguments.

The suit of Jesse E. Enyart, pioneer banker and resident, to establish an undivided interest in the Natorium Amusement Co., was ordered remanded back to the Jackson county circuit court for action towards definite settlement.

The suit was brought by Enyart against Stella J. Merrick, and Grace D. Brown, cross-complainant, and was dismissed by Judge Norton. The proceedings involved several claims of ownership, complicated by the death of F. E. Merrick, one of the original organizers, and the unsupported claim that Merrick had sold his interests prior to 1921 to Gold Gordon Voorhis. The Natorium was built in 1910, during the "boom". The company was dissolved in 1921.

Enyart claimed he invested \$14,000 in the enterprise, and asked for an accounting. The defendants claimed Enyart was guilty of "fraud", and left his investment in the hands of Merrick. The Merricks claimed the property failed to produce any revenue, save during three or four years, when tourist travel was heavy.

A petition for a rehearing in the suit of L. Niedermeyer against Earl H. Fehl and others was denied. The supreme court recently held that Fehl was entitled to credits, denied by a lower court decision, amounting to approximately \$3000. Niedermeyer asked for a rehearing. The suit was one of the complicated and involved financial suits denied by Fehl, in which Niedermeyer loaned money.

MILLER JENNINGS TO LAST REWARD

Miller Darius Jennings passed away at his home 1006 Maple Drive, Monday afternoon of arteriosclerotic, aged 62 years. Mr. Jennings was born at Buchanan, Michigan, March 10, 1872 and came to Jackson county ten years ago.

He leaves his wife, Anna M., four sons and one daughter, Lavern J., Twin Falls, Idaho; Earl A., Michigan; Ray M., San Francisco; Marie L., Lucile May Jennings, Medford.

WIFE BEATER IS KILLED BY SON

HARTFORD, Ky., July 24.—(AP)—Twelve-year old Blumier, Madison, who told a coroner's jury he killed his father because he couldn't bear to see his mother whipped was remanded to his mother's custody today by County Judge Rufus Rothwell pending a hearing Wednesday.

The boy told the coroner his father, Rousseau Malden, 38, a farmer and milk dealer, ran his wife away from home Sunday. She returned yesterday and was milking late yesterday afternoon. Rousseau went to the barn and began whipping her. Blumier said, and she cried for help.

"I secured the revolver from the dresser drawer and ran to the barn. I fired the first bullet into dad's back. As he turned quickly I fired two more bullets through his chest. He fell dead at my feet."

ROOSEVELT SHIP REACHES HAWAII

Aboard Cruiser New Orleans with President Roosevelt, KAILUA BAY, Hawaii, July 24.—(AP)—President Roosevelt returned aboard the Cruiser Houston this morning awaiting a formal welcome from Joseph B. Poindexter, governor of Hawaii, who was to board the Houston this morning.

Plans for the rest of the day were uncertain, pending the governor's call of welcome.

The New Orleans and the Houston anchored in picturesque Kailua Bay, just off the village of Kailua, shortly after 8 o'clock this morning. A bright sun already was shining over the lava mountains of "Big Island" of the Hawaiian group.

FARLEY INITIATED IN ANCIENT ORDER WHISKER GROWERS

EUGENE, July 24.—(AP)—Genial big Jim Farley, postmaster-general of the United States, was inducted into the ancient order of Bushwhackers, whisker-growing organization of the Oregon Trail pageant celebration, when his train stopped here enroute to Portland this noon.

Mounted on the hobby horse of the whisker kangaroo court, the distinguished visitor was found guilty of falling to grow whiskers and was fined three postmasterships.

"You're letting me off easy," the prisoner said as he left the court. Greeted by several hundred Eugeneans, led by Edward F. Bailey, chairman of the Lane county democratic central committee, Mr. Farley spoke briefly before the crowd during the 15 minutes his train stopped here.

"President Roosevelt is stronger right now than he was when he was elected," Farley declared, adding that the result of the coming fall elections would demonstrate this sentiment. He declared the democrats were not worrying about Oregon, but refused to comment on whether the election, in this republican state would constitute a test of the administration's popularity.

supplied the information that ended the Indiana outlaw. Attorney General Homer S. Cummings, who stopped in Chicago last night briefly while en route to Hawaii, said he knew who furnished the tip, but that he would not direct payment of the reward until after his return from the mid-Pacific.

The "girl in red" and a woman companion were reported by the Chicago police to be held, but the federal agents denied this.

Other reports mentioned the names of two convicts who might have given the authorities the "tip of death." From them, the reports said, Sergeant Martin Zarkovich of the East Chicago, Ind., police might have received the information that Dillinger could be located.

The end of Dillinger, federal authorities said, is but the beginning of a new and highly organized drive to capture other members of the Dillinger mob, especially George "Baby Face" Nelson, also known as Lester Gills.

Detroit police were reported looking for Nelson on the theory that a motor car that figured in a Detroit holdup was used by him in escaping from Sandusky, O.

Many View Body. While the speculation over the "tip off" was at its height the morbidly curious had their chance to satisfy their longing for a look at Dillinger's body. From early Sunday night on they turned the Cook county morgue into a lively spot, jamming in to see the man who brought terror to the middle west.

What they saw was a body, tilted on an angle of 45 degrees in a glass cage. On each big toe was a tab, labeled "Dillinger."

There was so much pushing and shoving among the crowds that Deputy Coroner Jacob M. Schewel had to shout a warning that no more spectators would be permitted to view the body until they behaved.

"We'll behave," they shouted and another throng marched forward to see John Dillinger in death.

Crime Doesn't Pay. "I wouldn't have wanted to see him," one spectator remarked, "except I think it's a moral lesson, don't you? It's like the coroner said, 'crime doesn't pay,' does it?"

No one answered, but there was the \$7.70 they found in Dillinger's pocket and there was the \$5 it cost to hold the inquest.

"I hope," said Coroner Walsh as he closed the inquest, "that it won't be long before the rest of the Dillinger gang is brought to justice in a similar manner and it will be a pleasure as coroner to conduct these inquests. I am gratified to report that all this cost the county was \$5 for a jury."

And probably, the police believe, the coroner's hope will be realized.

Information from police sources last night indicated that a former convict whose sweetheart Dillinger stole put him on the spot.

She was the "mysterious woman in red," who with a woman companion was at the desperado's side when he was killed by police bullets.

The government today added to their list of persons wanted, the physician who through fear or revenue gave Dillinger his facial disguise. The desperado's face had undergone a surgical operation. Two incisions had been made to give the face a rounded contour and another to obliterate a chin dimple.

LA GRANDE WANTS LEGION CONCLAVE

LA GRANDE, Ore., July 24.—(AP)—La Grande post of the American Legion today was preparing to issue invitations to every post in Oregon to hold the 1935 convention here.

A committee headed by Fred E. Kidde, former state commander, is in charge of the campaign and will head a delegation of some eight Legionnaires and auxiliary members to Astoria next month to attend the 1934 convention. The La Grande drum corps, 1933 state champion, will defend its title in Astoria in August.

He said he had told the youths to "drive the car around the block," in a demonstration. He testified that "around the block" did not literally mean that, but a distance sufficient for a test of the worthiness of the auto. The car was driven to this city. Ashcraft swore to the complaint.

In the light of this evidence the court directed an acquittal.

In the case of Alfred Poston of Pinehurst, indicted a year ago for assault with a deadly weapon, Poston entered a plea of guilty to simple assault, and sentence was deferred until September 4. The action arose out of a roadside argument with state troopers, over game laws. The case was called for last spring but was postponed owing to Poston's being unable to reach court, when his auto broke down on a stormy day.

The case of Manzie Bidden indicted for alleged communication malignant disease to another, was postponed indefinitely upon motion of the district attorney. An 18-year-old girl, now held in a Portland institution for erring maids is the chief witness.

Electa A. Fehl, wife of E. H. Fehl, serving four years in state prison for vote stealing complicity, May Murray and E. L. Fitch, indicted for criminal libel, all entered pleas of guilty, and passage of sentence was deferred for 30 days. The bonds of Mrs. Fehl and May Murray, each placed at \$1000 were ordered continued. Fitch was ordered released upon his own recognizance. The court said, "he has already served about the sentence I would impose upon him." Fitch has been in the county jail ten weeks.

The court indicated from the bench, if he had passed sentence yesterday he would have imposed a 60 day sentence upon Fitch, a 90 day sentence upon May Murray, and a 120 day sentence upon Mrs. Fehl.

active among the fruit workers of California, in the Fresno and Sacramento valley districts. Several of the leaders and chief aides have been arrested for violation of the criminal syndicalism laws. The same procedure will be forthcoming here when acts justify, it is said.

Public opinion generally favors firm action against any attempt of a minority to create turmoil in this county. The community, as a whole, after the costly experience with agitators Banks and Pehl, is disposed to this course. The success of the latter pair has caused the impression that Jackson county is "a sucker for a fast talker."

All of the literature scheduled for circulation here, bears the Communist label, and is identical with that distributed in the longshoremen's strike belt. No violence is advocated, but "passive resistance" is.
