



CRUCIAL SERIES SEEN THIS WEEK IN COAST LEAGUE

Two more of those oft-recurring "crucial" series bob up this week to take a hand in determining the coast league championship.

San Francisco takes its three game first place lead to Wrigley field for seven games with Los Angeles, winner of the first half title now sharing second place with Hollywood. The Stars journey to San Francisco for a busy week with the fourth place Missions, who trail them by a single game.

This week's engagements are the beginning of three weeks of battling among the four leaders that should pretty well settle the second half race. Next week the four change opponents, the Missions and Stars tangling while the Angels cross bats with the Stars. Then the Angels and Stars square off again, with the Stars entertaining the Reds at Los Angeles.

On the basis of their showings last week San Francisco and Los Angeles stack up about even, with the Missions holding the edge over the Stars who faltered badly to lose six of eight games at Oakland.

Oakland has the week's easiest assignment in the very much beaten Portland Beavers. Dutch Ruether's Seattle Indians, somewhat chastened by a 5-2 series licking at San Francisco, face Sacramento at the California capital.

TUNGATE'S CHUCKING GIVES GILMORE 4-2 WIN IN GRANTS PASS

Behind the three-hit pitching of Ray Tungate, the Gilmore Lyons again defeated the Grants Pass Stars, 4-2, at the Climate City Sunday, after trailing 2-0 until the seventh inning.

EXTEND CAPITAL STOCK TAX TIME

PORTLAND, July 24.—(Sp.)—The period during which capital stock tax returns may be filed and the tax paid, has been extended to August 31, 1934, in the case of returns required to be filed in the continental United States, according to a treasury decision received today by J. W. Maloney, collector of internal revenue.

The capital stock tax returns involved are for the period ended June 30, 1934. It is provided, under the terms of the extension granted, that such returns, accompanied with the tax due, must be in the hands of the collectors of internal revenue on or before August 31, 1934.

Capital stock tax forms required to be filed are not now available. Upon their receipt in the collector's office they will be mailed immediately to all corporations filing returns in the district of Oregon.

J. "Dizzy" Dean, a young man who can see so far ahead that he's already asking \$18,500 for next season's work, is strutting around the metropolis today looking for an argument on the subject. He won't get it from any of the Cardinals who play baseball with him.

The young right-hander, who never got his nickname on the ball field, did a lot of highly important things for the St. Louis Red Birds yesterday. He pitched the Cards to a 6 to 5 victory over the world champion Giants, for one thing, his tenth straight, his eighteenth of the National league campaign, and the seventh straight for the Frankie Frisch outfit that suddenly has decided to go places.

He made it possible for the Cards to cut the lead of the champions to three full games with three more to go in the series, a simple problem in addition and subtraction whereby it can be proven that continued success would lock the Cards and Giants together by the time the Birds leave town.

With the Cubs holding grimly to second place, two games back, the Cards all of a sudden have become the team the Giants must beat back immediately, if the orderly procession of the past couple of months is to be maintained.
