YOUNG JACKSON KEEPS TITLE BY NOD OVER PAYNE

PORTLAND, July 25.—(P)—Young Peter Jackson, Los Angeles negro, today retained Pacific coast lightweight championship, thanks to his effective counter-punching which blocked the vicious onslaughts of Cecil Payne of Louisville in the 10-round fight here last night.

From an early no-count knock-down, due partially to loss of footing, Jackson counter-punched to a close decision. Each weighed 135. Payne forced the fight most of the way, with Jackson content to await opportunities to block and sharpshoot. The few times Jackson led, Payne got the better of toe-to-toe encounters.

Elmer (Buzz) Brown, 127, Portland, scored a technical knockout over speedy Corpus, 128, Manila, in the fifth of their scheduled eight-rounder. Abe Abraham, 175, Reno, was no match for Tiger Jack Fox, 178, Terre Haute, Ind., and their fight was stopped in the first round.

Leroy Gibson, 130, Wichita, Kans., scored a technical knockout over Louisa Nelson, 130, Portland, in the third of a scheduled six-round bout. Squatty Jack Hibbard, 133, Klamath Falls, launched a two-fisted attack which continued incessantly as he gained a close four-round decision over Bill Overby, 148, Spokane, Wash.

Combs, who suffered a skull fracture and a broken collarbone when he crashed into the left field stand while leaping to catch a fly ball, was in a serious condition at a hospital here. His physician, Dr. Robert P. Hyland, today said his condition was satisfactory and "showed improvement after a restful night."

FIRST MILLION FOR BRIDGES IN PORTLAND SOON

PORTLAND, July 25.—(AP)—The first \$1,000,000 of the \$5,602,000 federal loan and grant for construction of five bridges on the Oregon coast highway, soon will be on deposit in a Portland bank.

The protracted negotiations for the federal money were concluded today when the state highway commission signed the formal contract and deposited temporary funds to secure the advance of the first million dollars.

With the bridge deal finally disposed of, the commission took up allotment of the government appropriation for Oregon highways, an amount totaling \$3,432,109.

This money was to be distributed by districts on the basis of population, area and mileage of federal primary highways.

Fifty per cent of the appropriation is to be applied to federal primary highways, 25 per cent to secondary roads, and 25 per cent to highways within municipalities.

The allocation for primary highways follows: District No. 1, including northwestern counties north of Junction City, \$792,067; district No. 2, all western counties south of Junction City, \$297,791; district No. 3, central Oregon, \$310,000; eastern Oregon, \$230,488.

For secondary highways the allotment was: District 1, \$369,911; No. 2, \$134,000; No. 3, \$148,811; No. 4, \$160,685.

The allotment for municipalities was: District No. 1, \$378,871; No. 2, \$133,300; No. 3, \$148,811; No. 4, \$185,000.

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SOLONS, PIRATES LOSE CHANCE BY PROLONGED DIVE

From pennant winner and leading contender to just a couple of second division clubs—that summarizes the slumps of the Washington Senators and Pittsburgh Pirates.

Pittsburgh, which was expected to be in the midst of the current National league race with the Giants, Cubs and Cardinals, found itself near the bottom of the season's worst slump today after nine straight defeats. The Bucs struck a new low yesterday when they took a 9 to 0 beating from the Phillies, being limited to four hits by Sylvester Johnson, and dropped a point behind Boston into fifth place.

The Senators were in even worse condition as they skidded off into the sixth notch in the American league standing for the second time within a week after a 4-1 defeat at the hands of the last-place White Sox.

The Giants snubbed the Cardinals' race toward the top of the National league on Boy Parmelee's four-hit flinging, winning 5 to 0, and the Tigers, in the American league came through to a 6 to 3 triumph over Boston's Red Sox.

The decision increased Detroit's lead to three games over the Yankees as the Browns handed New York a 4 to 2 setback to go into fifth place. The second-place Cubs held their spot two games behind the Giants by making good use of six hits and seven walks off Van Mungo to beat the Dodgers 6 to 3 behind Bill Lee's steady hurling.

Old Fritz Rhem provided the fourth of the National League's good mound performances by holding the Reds to seven hits while the Braves broke a six-game losing streak with a 4-3 victory that lifted them barely into the first division. In the American Monte Pearson recorded his 12th victory as the third place Indians defeated Philadelphia 10 to 6.

BREAD BOOSTED BY BAKER CODE

With the new state bakers' code in effect, the price of bread and other bakery products had advanced one cent, according to W. A. Gates of the Economy Grocerians. The code, which went into effect this week, was formulated by a committee of bakery men throughout the state, and was approved by Max Gehlhar, director of agriculture for Oregon, he said.

The state code does not contain labor requirements, as these are contained in the federal code, he pointed out. Mr. Gates said the selling agreement was arranged by the large retailers of the state. The code definitely sets the prices for various types of breadstuffs.
