

Oregonian And Statesman Among Early Establishments - First World News Months Old,

SALEM, Ore. (UP)-While editors nd publishers of Oregon's numerous daily and weekly newspapers gathered in state convention at Roschurg. capitol historians recalled the early days of journalism and printing in the Northwest.

The first printing on the Pacific coast, records showed, was done in 1849 at Lapwal, a small mission set-tlement in Oregon territory near the present city of Lewiston, Idaho, The press used was a small one sent from Hopelink Honolulu by the American board, affiliated with the Congrega-tional and Presbyterian churches, Re-ligious literature was printed. Now In Museum The press was used later for

printing various periodicals in Ore-gon. It is on exhibition now at the Oregon Historical society miseum at the Auditorium, Porland. The first Pacific coast newspaper

The Oregon Speciator auspended
publication in March, 1855. By this
time several other papers had been
started in the territory, Chief among
them was the Portland Oregonian and

continued publication to the present day.

The first issue of the Oregonian was printed December 4, 1850. The Oregon Statesman started publication at Oregon City, March 28, 1851. It moved to Salem in June, 1853, when the territorial capital was established here. Asahel Bush, first editor of the Statesman, also was the first state printer. printer. Oregon newspapers now receive
