LEATHERS, KRUSE KARASICK, KENT IN DOUBLE BILL

Two New Faces to Be Seen On Great Card Promoted by Lillard—Show Opens at 8:30 at the Armory

Four grapplers will vie on the armory mat tonight for the privilege of meeting "Jumping Joe" Savoldi, ex-Notre Dame football star, here in a match about August 15, when he will tangle with an opponent to be chosen through two rounds of elimination.

In tonight's first rounds, "Sag" Sam Letthers, 230, tall Texas muscle mangle, will tangle with Bob Kruse, broccoli farmer from Oswego, in the first half of the double main event.

Another meaty dish will be handed out in tonight's second match when 235-pound Harry Kent, gridster from Oregon State, meets Al Karasick, Russian mauler, who has made such a hit recently in the Hawaiian Islands.

Letthers will employ his spectacular rocking scissors against the Oswego farmer, and boasts that he has a method devised whereby his supple body will twist away from Kruse's dangerous wristlocks with little trouble.

The Texan is said to be light on his feet as well as being built like iron, but he will have to make the best of these advantages if he plans to last against the tricky and hard-hitting broccoli king.

Kent, who has not appeared here before, plans to make his first bout in Medford a good one, and has limbered up his favorite defense, the flying tackle, to use against Karasick. The Russian is a colorful grappler and his bone-crunching mat work is punctuated with roars that make his appearance not soon forgotten.

Promoter Mack Lillard is highly pleased with this week's card and promises fans a good show that will be more than worth the prices, which have been reduced to a uniform rate for all seats. The first bout will get under way at 8:30.

SAVOLDI'S KICK FLATTENS KRUSE

PORTLAND, Ore., July 26.—(AP)—Jumping Joe Savoldi demonstrated his famous drop-kick in a wrestling match here last night, but it was his unusual feat of surviving an airplane spin which brought him victory over Bob Kruse. The former Notre Dame football star flattened Kruse in 18 seconds with a drop-kick, executed with both feet foremost.

Kruse gained the second fall in 16 seconds when he ducked Savoldi's second drop-kick and clamped a wrist lock. After 18 minutes of wrestling Kruse applied an airplane spin, but for some reason landed on the bottom of the pile. Kruse weighed 210, Savoldi 200.

Miss Marble, playing in the French championships several weeks ago at Paris, against Mme. Jung Henrwtin, collapsed on the court. She was carried from the center of play and taken to the American hospital, where she spent three weeks. She, too, was suffering from pleurisy.

And now the little San Francisco girl, who experts predicted some day would capture a few championships, finds her advance halted at a time when she was beginning to go places. And the experts who their heads solemnly and say that she's through.
