

### 60 CARS OF BARTS ROLLED OUT SINCE START OF PICKING

Up to Thursday night Bartlett pear shipments over the Southern Pacific railroad totaled 63—two of packed fruit and 61 cars consigned to California and Willamette valley canneries.

Many of the local Bartletts are going into cold storage and some are scheduled to reach the New York markets by the end of next week. The bulk of the estimated Bartlett tonnage of the valley has been contracted to canneries at prices ranging from \$32.50 to \$35 per ton. Some of the first sales were listed at \$30 per ton.

Loading of canneries Bartletts is under way, including the crop of the Young and Hall orchard, scheduled to be dispatched late today or in the morning. Daily shipments are being made.

The first picking of Bartletts is expected to be completed by the middle of next week. A number of the late Bartlett orchards will not start picking until next Monday.

Offers of \$1.80 net per box for Howells, with more if the market justifies, have been reported. The Howells are the next variety to be picked. The offered price is considered "good" and slightly higher than for the past four years.

Packers all report that the Bartlett crop this season is of exceptional quality and size, and in excellent condition.

The labor situation remains normal, with local labor being given the preference. There are less transient workers than at any time in five years. Some of the larger orchards are paying pickers by the box, with a bonus at the end of the picking season. A good picker, it is said, can make from \$3 to \$4 per day, depending on his ability. The bonus benefits both the picker and grower by providing an incentive to the worker and enabling the grower to keep the same crew all season.

### LEGAL AND CRIMINAL BUSINESS OF COUNTY TAKES SUMMER LULL

Official activity in Jackson county is now in the quietest period in four years. There is a mid-summer lull in suit filing, taxpaying and crime. Most of the lawyers are getting ready for well-earned vacations. The taxpayers, who had been remitting better than at any time since 1930, are

also resting and apparently busy telling for their next quarterly payment. Petty crime is also in the doldrums. The sheriff's office has received the minimum of reports of gasoline, tire, tractor wheels, and garden truck thefts. Two and three years ago, there were daily complaints of petty stealing from the rural areas and at one time a farmer was liable to lose most anything not under lock and key. Even stealing in the towns has declined. Neither have any summer cabins been looted lately.

Authorities attribute the law abiding to the improvement of labor conditions and decline in the number of indigent transients making this section their stamping grounds.

Legitimate legal activity is expected to be resumed about September 1.

"The past two weeks have been the quietest in the past two years," County Clerk George R. Carter said this morning. "It is enabling the office force to catch up some of the detail work that has been accumulating."
