PORTLAND LAWYER FOUND GUILTY OF INCOME EVASIONS

PORTLAND, Ore., July 28.—(AP)—Charged with failure to make an income tax return for 1930, when his earnings amounted to \$131,637, J. O. Arnold, disbarred attorney, was convicted by a federal court jury here today.

The jury acquitted Arnold on two other charges which had alleged that he failed to pay income taxes on his earnings for 1928 and 1929, aggregating more than \$200,000.

Taking note of reputed statements by Arnold that he would kill himself and would never go to jail, Carl G. Donough, United States attorney, ordered his bail increased to \$5000 from \$3000.

The federal court jury deliberated more than 24 hours before returning the verdict. It was the first income tax evasion trial ever handled here and required nine days for presentation.
