RETURN TO WORK AND ARBITRATION STARTS TUESDAY

(Continued from page one) shorter hours, complete control of the hiring halls from which they are dispatched to jobs, and unequalled recognition of their union—in other words, "closed shop."

The employers two weeks ago agreed to arbitrate everything, including the red-hot issue of hiring hall control. The bitter strike was only a couple of weeks old when the employers offered to recognize the I. L. A., as representing the waterfront workers, "for the purpose of collective bargaining."

Threatened Force Last Friday night Governor Meier, who had earlier called out the Oregon National Guard to be held for emergency action, declared that unless the port of Portland had been peacefully reopened by Monday (today), he would open it by force.

Last night, however, advised that the workers were to return to their jobs Tuesday morning, the governor said "I am in hope that in view of the settlement, things will go along without any new complications."

All steamship lines will resume schedules here this week. Most of the schedules are made up and ready to be put into effect.

The National Guard, 1100 strong, remained at the Camp Withcombe encampment ten miles from Portland.

CCC YOUTH DROWNS FROM HEART ATTACK IN STEAMBOAT POOL

ROSEBURG, Ore., July 30.—(AP)—Apparently seized by a heart attack as he plunged into the swimming hole at Steamboat CCC camp, 45 miles east of Steamboat, Connie Smith, 18, yesterday, of Chicago, was drowned late yesterday. Smith, a member of the Civilian Conservation Corps, was unable to swim and was being closely watched by his companions. His body was recovered within a very few seconds after he collapsed in fairly shallow water and resuscitation efforts were continued for more than two hours. Coroner H. C. Stearns, called to make the official investigation, reported death due to a heart attack induced by the shock of cold water.

Smith was enrolled July 6 at Fort Sheridan, Illinois, and arrived at Steamboat camp only a week ago. The body was taken to Medford to be prepared for shipment to Chicago. An autopsy was being conducted this afternoon by Lieutenant Wallace S. Douglas, district surgeon of the CCC and Lieutenant Hjalmer T. Gentile, assistant district surgeon.
