DELAWARE, O.—(UP)—Eight adults and two children were held in county jail after a raid on an alleged nudist camp near here by Sheriff C. E. McKinnis.

"A space of two acres had been carefully cleared of underbrush," the sheriff said. "The debris had been piled around the edges to form a wall of brush. Some of the people had a bath. None were playing volleyball, some were pitching horseshoes and some were sitting around talking."

A man, who said he was a member of the "executive board" of the camp, told the sheriff the group called themselves the Health Builders' club. He said he was an unemployed school teacher.

Dillinger's Brain Examined to Find Criminal Causes

CHICAGO, Aug. 1.—(AP)—Coroner Frank J. Walsh said today that scientists under his direction were studying portions of the brain and vital organs of the slain John Dillinger, gang chief.

The brain and parts of his lungs, heart and kidneys were subjected to a minute scrutiny by pathologists for traces of abnormality or disease which might have had some influence on Dillinger's anti-social tendencies. A report on their findings will be made soon, the coroner said.

"We are seeking to determine whether the brains of criminals are deformed or abnormal in any way—whether their murderous lives were caused by some brain or organic phenomenon," he said.

FISH LAKE CLOSED AS WARM WATERS SPOIL FISH TASTE

PORTLAND, Ore., Aug. 1.—(AP)—A 30-day open season on migratory birds—spread over 10 weeks, with shooting allowed only three days a week—was adopted by the state game commission late yesterday.

Each season would conform to the 30-day limit set by the biological survey. Shooting will be on Fridays, Saturdays and Sundays only.

The season will open Friday, October 26, and close on Sunday, December 30.

An effort to make shooting dates on the Pacific coast conform met a deadlock in the state of Washington. Because of the zoning question Washington favors the spread-shooting plan, but wants different dates for the eastern and western parts of the state.

This is contrary to wishes of the biological survey and the President's conservation board.

California reported it would largely be governed by decision of the Washington and Oregon commissions.

CURTISS FLOPS SPANISH MATMAN

SALEM, Aug. 1.—(AP)—In a fast and clean bout here last night, both wrestling using nothing but orthodox wrestling grips, Jack Curtiss, New Mexico, took the first and third falls to win the main event from Pascual Costello, Spanish grappler.

In the rough semi-windup Don Sugal, Salem, took the first fall from Bulldog Jackson with an airplane spin, and then forced the latter to quit the ring shortly after the start of the second round, Jackson had threatened to withdraw several times before, complaining of Sugal's use of his punishing Japanese ticks.

Mickey McGuire, west Salem, and Wayne Stumbaugh, Los Angeles, wrestled to a 30-minute draw in the opener, both gaining one fall.

EUGENE, Aug. 1.—(AP)—With receipts virtually balancing expenditures, the Oregon Trail celebration held in Eugene last week was an assured financial success, it was announced here today by Hugh Rowan, manager of the event.

While exact figures are not available as the audit has not been completed, it was deemed certain today that underwriters would not be called upon to pay one cent of their pledges and in addition, the balance of \$2500 left from the 1929 patent is expected to be maintained intact.

Receipts for the celebration, with all cash in except a few hundred dollars expected from salvage of equipment, totaled \$21,508. Expenses, when all bills are paid, are expected to amount to \$21,540. Both of these figures may vary slightly in the final accounting, it was said.

The present itself produced \$15,820 with the queen contest, dances and other items making up the balance.
