

TEAR GAS BOMBS NOW ON HAND AT SHERIFF'S OFFICE

There was nothing doing today in agitation circles of Jackson county, except that the "Cannery and Agricultural Workers Union" planned a closed meeting and picnic, and the receipt by the sheriff's office of a box of tear gas bombs from the federal laboratory at Pittsburgh, Pa.

The sheriff said there had been no reports of handbill distribution, speeches or sabotage. The authorities report that organizers for the C. A. A. W. U. held conferences at the old P. & E. depot, in the city park and in the railroad yards.

The county court yesterday consulted with two beneficiaries of county relief, who have been more or less active in the threatened uprising. They were told they would have to be more discreet in their comment against the American form of government in the future.

One of the two admitted "I talk too much," but explained that he was a student of economics and world affairs and "meant no harm."

The case was referred to the district attorney and the "economist" was given his relief warrant for last month with the warning, "We'll see how you behave in the future." He promised to cease giving aid and comfort to transient agitators.

ZIMMERMAN WINS WASHINGTON OPEN; AMATEURS START

INGLEWOOD GOLF CLUB, Seattle
Aug. 2.—(AP)—With the Washington state open championship finally decided, Emory Zimmerman, Portland professional, outstroking Jimmy Johnson, Tacoma pro, in 27 playoff holes, 32 amateurs settled down today to match-play battles for the amature crown.

Zimmerman defeated Johnson by three strokes yesterday after they were forced to travel nine extra holes following their scheduled 18-hole playoff. At the end of the first round of the course, the two stars were all square with 72s, one under par. Johnson having bagged an eagle-three at the last hole to make up three strokes.

In the second playoff the Tacoma pro three-putted three greens while Zimmerman was clipping two strokes off par for a nifty 35, and the state crown. Johnson took 38.

In the amateur race, two rounds of the matches were on the program today, after which only eight will remain to vie in the quarter and semi-finals tomorrow.

Johnny Shields, Seattle, winner of the title in 1930 and 1931, easily copied medalist honors when he blazed over the long, twisting Inglewood links in 70, three under par. Harry Givan, Seattle's defending champion, made the trip in 73.

SWIM CLASS HAS LARGE TURNOUT FOR FIRST NIGHT

Adult swimming classes, organized as a part of the local SERA recreational program, are being carried on regularly at Merrick's through the aid of a Red Cross life saving corps, which has been organized for the first time here by Marjorie Kelly and Max Gillinsky.

Twenty-three adults were present at the first class held Monday evening. Miss Golda Bone, recreational supervisor announced yesterday. The classes are held each Monday and Thursday evenings from 7 to 8 o'clock. Adults, as well as children in the afternoon classes, are asked to furnish their own suits and towels and pay a fee of 10 cents for use of the tank. Miss Marjorie Gott is in charge of the swimming program.

It is the hope of the life-saving corps to give a water pageant in the near future. Proceeds of the event will be used to furnish necessary equipment.

Mrs. Patsy Brock, Red Cross life-saving examiner, is conducting a swimming campaign every week day at Bybee bridge on Rogue river. About 50 are attending regularly, and showing great interest in the course, which includes beginners, swimmers and life-saving classes.

AMEND COMPLAINT HOLD-OVER BLIGHT IN DAMAGE CLAIM REMOVAL ADVISED

An amended complaint was filed in circuit court yesterday in the suit of Catherine Morgan against Luke Ryan and wife, and their son, Homer, 17, for \$8100 damages as the result of an auto accident March 31 last, about 10:30 p. m., on the Table Rock market road, about 13 miles from Medford. The complaint contends that Mr. Ryan and wife are responsible for the acts of their minor son.

The complaint alleges that the lights on the Ryan auto were defective, that Homer was driving at a high and reckless speed, that he was not a competent driver, and that as a result of the auto crash the plaintiff sustained great physical pain, mental anguish, nervous shock, and permanent injury.
