

ELLSWORTH WILL ATTEMPT FLIGHT INTO ANTARCTICA

November Set for Next Journey to Unexplored Lands — Vast Domain Offers Rich Field for Discovery

NEW YORK.—(UP)—Back to Antarctica again—that's where Lincoln Ellsworth, who has more than a mere nodding acquaintance with the local penguins, expects to be next November.

"The fascination of the Antarctic still lures me, even after the disappointment that brought about the abandonment of my January flight," he explains in Natural History, where in he has outlined his plans for the latest expedition.

Larger Than Europe.
Dr. Ellsworth claims that "no other unexplored land mass even remotely comparable in size awaits the inquisitiveness of man. For Antarctica is larger than all of Europe, and as yet only a minor fraction of its immensity has been seen and recorded by man."

Antarctica is one of the highest of the continents, apparently being approximately seven times the average height of Europe. Although its ice-cap is about 7,000 feet deep, its condition in the past was vastly different from that today. Large seams of coal have been discovered within several hundred miles of the South Pole; they measure 40 feet thick and run for hundreds of miles. In addition, fossil plant stems 18 inches in diameter have been found, plus fragmentary impressions of larger trees—all evidence of a possible lush past.

Discovery Flight
Now, declares Dr. Ellsworth, is the time for pioneer surveys of the region. His proposed flight over this little known continent really will be a voyage of discovery, and will subtract a belt of the unknown from that which is now marked "conjectured land" on the charts.

His supplies will be carried to the base of operations at Deception island, which is south of Cape Horn. Material for extensive research and the plane with which the flight is to be executed again, will be carried on the "Wyatt Earp," which, incidentally, is named after one of the most accurate sharpshooters in the old west.

FIRE DRILL AT APPLGATE CCC

GOLD OF ALASKA GAINS NEW LURE

SEATTLE.—(UP)—In 1897 a ton of gold was taken out of Alaska valued at \$480,000 and the world was started.

In 1934 more gold will be taken out of the rich territory than ever before at a value of \$840,000 a ton.

News of strikes, hundreds of prospectors along the old Yukon Trail and old, idle mines yielding big returns at the new price of \$35 an ounce, was brought to Seattle by persons returning from Alaska.

Capital has been thrown into the new hunt for gold and expensive machinery is taking the place of the pick and shovel. Little has been written about it because mine operators and prospectors don't want "the world to move in on them."

Unusual activity was reported along the White Pass and Yukon railroad, near Bennett, Carcross and Whitesore.

Carcross, easily reached via Skagway, is booming. So is Atlin and Dawson, where prospectors are reported along every creek with gold pans and sluice boxes.

North and east of Fairbanks, a "new" gold field was opening up and scores of prospectors were along the Tolovana river district.
