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ROOSEVELT'S SHIP ENTERS COLUMBIA PORTLAND BOUND

Site of a \$55,000,000 dam near Devil's Lake, N. D., will be reached Tuesday morning, where the president will be shown the effects of the drought.

Wednesday, August 8, the president's train will be in Rochester, Minn., where Roosevelt will participate in the presentation of a citation, authorized by the national executive committee of the American Legion, to Dr. William J. and Chas. H. Mayo in connection with their work at the Mayo institute. The president also is expected to lay a wreath on the monument of William Worrall Mayo, founder of the institution.

Plan Mississippi Ride After a motor trip to Lake City, the president will be a guest of the Mayo brothers on a boat ride down the Mississippi river to Winona, during which he will see public works administration dams at Alma, Whittemore and Winona as part of the \$25,000,000 canalization project on that stream.

The president will make his second national broadcast at Green Bay, Wis., when he participates in the celebration of the 300th anniversary of the settlement of Wisconsin.

From Green Bay, the president will proceed through Chicago to Washington without stopping.

Clear Tracks During his ride across the nation, the president's special train, carrying about 50 persons, and preceded by a pilot train, will be given a clear track. Schedules of freight trains will be retarded or advanced several hours while passenger trains will be sidetracked for a few minutes, while the special speeds along eastward. So carefully has the itinerary been planned, however, that other passenger trains will be able to be on their way with virtually no loss of time.

Eight oil burning Great Northern locomotives, capable of drawing the president's train along at 80 miles an hour, will work in relay between Portland and St. Paul. Regardless of outside heat, the temperature in the special will be kept by the air-conditioning apparatus at 70 degrees.

Wenatchee apples and other local products will be featured on the menu in accordance with the regular practice of the railroad, but no special requests have been made for the president, officials of the Great Northern said.

In addition to President and Mrs. Roosevelt, reservations for the president's special included: The sons, John and Franklin D. Roosevelt, Jr.; Louis McHenry Howe and Stephen Early, presidential secretaries; Secretary of the Treasury Henry Morgenthau, Jr.; Secretary of the Interior Harold I. Ickes; Rudolph Forster, executive clerk of the White House; H. M. Kanne, assistant to Marvin McIntire, presidential secretary; Mrs. Malvina Scheider, secretary to Mrs. Roosevelt; Dr. R. T. McIntyre, the president's personal physician; Capt. W. Brown, naval aide; Col. E. M. Watson, military aide, and Rear Admiral Cary T. Grayson.
