14 CANDIDATES ASPIRE TO SEAT HELD BY BRYAN

OMAHA, Neb. (UP)—About 200 candidates will seek places on Republican and Democratic tickets for state offices in the August 14 primary of which nine Democrats and five Republicans aspire to succeed Charles Wayland Bryan as governor. Roy L. Cochrane of Lincoln, who has been retained by Democratic and Republican administrations for many years as state engineer, is the leading Democratic aspirant. Cochrane will have the tacit support of the Arthur P. Mullen faction as well as the active support of the strong state group headed by Governor Bryan. Opposing Cochrane is Congressman Terry Carpenter of Scottsbluff, Stanton, Eugene O'Sullivan, Omaha's leading criminal lawyer, Mrs. Maud Nquist, former head of the Nebraska Women's club, Mayor John P. Rohr of Fremont, W. F. Porter of Lincoln, J. O. Stroble of Nebraska City and Frank J. Klopping, state senator from Wayne. Three candidates are given a chance in the Republican battle. These are Dwight Griswold Gordon, publisher; former Attorney General C. A. Sorenson, Lincoln, who claims to be a "buddie" of Senator George W. Norris, Nebraska's most revered politician, and former Lieutenant Governor Theodore W. Metcalfe, and George W. Sterling, the other two candidates. Senator Norris' uncameral or one-house legislature plan, is an issue in the gubernatorial fight, although the plan will not be voted upon until the November elections. Leaders who have toured the farming communities come back with the information that the plan is not meeting favor, these men say, that they will lose their representation if a single, 33-member legislature is substituted for the present upper and lower houses containing 36 senators and 100 representatives. Leaders of both parties also oppose the plan because it would eliminate party government, it calling for a nonpartisan ballot.

Forest Preservation Studied Abroad for Program in America

PHILADELPHIA—(UP)—With the objective of learning the methods of forest preservation in foreign countries, a group of foresters and lumbermen from all parts of the United States are studying the practices used in Germany and Austria. A five-band study of sustained forest production, as well as game preservation, selected cutting, reforestation and markets for wood products is sought by the group in developing the program of permanent forest management in this country, now required by the lumber code.

The work is sponsored by the Carl Shurz Memorial Foundation and the Oberlander Trust, which was set up as a means to aid the American public in studying the special achievements of Germany and Austria. Private forests for private profit was listed by the foundation as one of the fields in which Germany has excelled.

Dr. Franz Hecke, director of the forestry school at Tharand near Dresden, is in charge of the group. He spent three months in this country acquainting himself with conditions that face American foresters.
