

BROADWAY GIRLS FIND ICE SITTING TEST NOT SO HOT

Winner of Contest in Times Square Cabaret Spends 5 1/2 Hours On Cake of Ice to Take Loving Cup

United Press Staff Correspondent NEW YORK, Aug. 3.—(UP)—Six young ladies will remember August 2 as the day they spent with their backs to the kitchen stove after having engaged in a remarkable contest to see which could sit the longest on a block of ice.

The contest took place in the Times Square cabaret, with a 24-inch loving cup going to the winner and consolation awards of \$10 each to the girls who couldn't take it. As, one by one, they removed themselves from the ice chunks, they seemed to be in need of consolation.

5 Hours on Ice Miss Barbara Searle, a young woman with great staying powers, was awarded the cup after five and a half hours of uninterrupted ice sitting. With the orchestra playing a South Sea Island melody, Miss Searle slipped from her greatly diminished block of stiff water, snatched the cup from the judge's hands, and ran in her bathing suit from the dance floor.

A few moments later one of the other girls was seen to enter Miss Searle's dressing room, carrying a hair brush. Several persons vow they heard a smacking noise right after that.

Strange Broadcast The contest began with a peculiar radio broadcast. The announcer stood with his microphone in the middle of the dance floor.

"Ladies and gentlemen," he said, "we are now having an international broadcast. If any of you want to step up here and speak—advertising your products, speak to your friends, or say hello to another, the air is yours at \$50 for 15 minutes. If you happen to have a mother in Jugoslavia, you can say hello to her, because this broadcast crosses the sea."

Gets an Offer A gentleman at one of the tables, who had been mumbling mere nothing to himself, staggered to his feet. "I got a mother in Jugoslavia," he said. He collapsed in his chair amid a burst of applause. The orchestra struck up "I've Got My Ice on You" and the Misses Barbara Searle, Leelle Babbette, Mickey King, Connie Hailton, Joan Duboise and Mae Gordon swept onto the floor in skimpy bathing suits. A moment later and they were on the ice block.

Two Last Quick After 70 minutes two girls quit, describing themselves as cold. Five minutes after that a customer came up and offered Miss Gordon \$10 if she would remove herself from the ice, dress and become his companion for the evening, presumably to sit on his lap. She accepted.

In another hour Miss Searle had only one competitor—Miss Ralston. After four and a half hours, Miss Ralston's teeth began to chatter and she gave up. Miss Searle, just to prove her right to the championship, sat on ice for another hour.

After it was all over she was asked what she intended to do with the loving cup. "I'm going to take it home," she said, "and write my bathing suit out in it." "How does it feel to be the winner?" your correspondent asked. "Well," said Miss Searle, "it doesn't feel so hot."

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WILLIAM H. LEWIS, PIONEER RESIDENT, TO FINAL REWARD

William Henry Lewis, one of the best known residents of Jackson county, where he had resided since coming here in 1888, passed away at his ranch home north of Central Point at 5:30 Wednesday evening, at the age of 74.

Mr. Lewis was born in Sheridan county, Missouri, January 1, 1860. At the age of 28 he came to Jackson county and settled in the Applegate section, where he was united in marriage to Ida Wright, who survives.

It was in Applegate where their three children were born. They are Robert Lewis and Lester L. Lewis of Central Point and Wm. L. of the Lewis super service station in Medford.

In 1901 the family moved to the Central Point ranch, where they have resided since that time and where Mr. Lewis has been engaged in the stock raising business continually.

Mr. Lewis had been in failing health for some time, but was thought to be improving when he suffered an acute heart attack.

Funeral services will be conducted at the Conger chapel by Rev. J. M. Johnson, at 2:30 Saturday. Interment will be in the Central Point cemetery.

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WHEAT REDUCTION SURVEY NEAR END

The wheat survey of Jackson county, conducted under the supervision of County Agent Robert G. Fowler, has been practically completed.

The final report on acreage being filed this morning. Applications for second payment of the wheat reduction funds will be dispatched to Washington, D. C., within the week. It will total between \$16,000 and \$17,000.

According to County Agent Fowler, all growers complied with their reduction of acreage contracts, under the Agricultural Adjustment act, to a remarkable degree and difficulties experienced in other Northwest sections were not encountered here.

Credit Production Corporation loans, issued for the district comprising Jackson, Josephine, Douglas, Coos and Curry counties up to August 1, totaled \$124,541.10, according to Luther Deuel, secretary of the organization. This comprises loans approved.
