Fields, whose movie audiences here laughed to stardom, brought his brand new film, "The Old Fashioned Way," to the Craterian Theatre yesterday and well-nigh threw the first day audiences into a panic with his hysterical clowning. The film tells the story of a grand old trouper who leads his poverty stricken troupe from town to town in their search for fame—and food. With high spirits and low funds, they manage to keep one jump ahead of the sheriff and two weeks behind in salaries.

Bobby LeRoy, the cute little youngster who has already appeared in several other productions, has an important part in the picture. 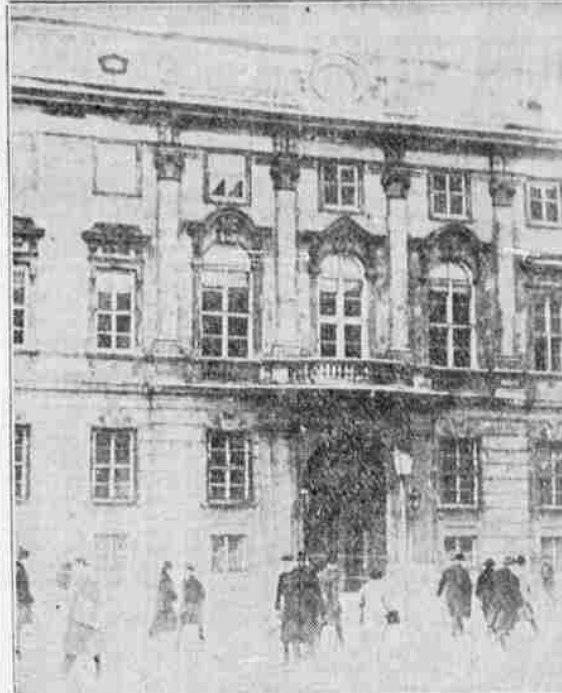
