

DORRIS HOMELESS RECEIVING RELIEF FROM RED CROSS

DORRIS, Calif.—(Spl.)—With 45 privately owned homes destroyed and household goods either destroyed or badly damaged, four hundred and fifty persons comprising 90 distressed families today are receiving assistance from the American Red Cross which has begun the work of clearing debris and rehabilitating the residential district of Dorris which was swept by fire July 28.

While relief units are on the scene an appeal has gone forth to northern California and southern Oregon communities to raise \$7,500 for their stricken neighbors. At the same time the National Red Cross through A. L. Schafer, manager of the Pacific area, has made available \$7,500 of the \$15,000 relief fund required to meet the emergency and rehabilitation needs.

J. W. Richardson, director of disaster relief, and Miss Nell Parkinson, experienced relief worker, augmented the local Red Cross relief units that were on the scene from the very first. W. G. Hagelstein of the Dorris Red Cross branch and Mrs. Fred Starr of the Mendocino branch of the Siskiyou county chapter at Yreka, Calif., met the first emergency needs of all refugees.

Their call for help brought a ready response by Clyde Turner, chairman of the Siskiyou county chapter at Yreka, and from Glen Hout and Geo. Walton of the Klamath county chapter, Klamath Falls, Oregon, who came in from the south and north with blankets and supplies.

Families driven into the street were placed with friends or kind-hearted neighbors while food and clothing were provided to the destitute.

Red Cross relief workers in registering families that suffered in losses have revealed distressing conditions.

One family which had experienced great difficulty in getting through the winter period, due to economic stress, had been able to put up considerable fruit this summer and had just bought some new bedding. No one was at home when the fire started. Seeing the smoke they hurried home and got a few things out before the floor burned through, destroying most of their meager possessions.

Another family had carried their clothing and bedding into the backyard of their home, thinking they would be out of the path of the fire. The husband and father of seven children got up on the roof, fought the fire and saved the home, but the possessions caught fire and burned.

FRUIT MEN NAMED TO AID CONTROL
