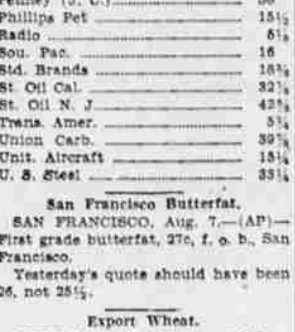

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CHARGES OF FRAUD NOT SUSTAINED IS RULING OF THOMAS

ROCHESTER, N. Y., Aug. 7.—(AP) Nearly every star in the professional golfing firmament tees off today in honor of Walter Hagen and a crack at the \$3000 prize money of the Rochester Centennial-Walter Hagen open championship.

Conceived as a feature of the city's one-month celebration of its 100th anniversary, the tournament was planned in honor of "The Hag," a native son. The 64 leaders and ties of today and tomorrow's 18-hole rounds will play the final 36 holes Thursday for the title and first money of \$600.

Among the stars entered are Paul Bunyan, newly crowned P. G. A. title holder, Denny Shupe, Dick Metz, Al Watrous, Ky Laffoon, Willie MacFarlane, Tom Creavy, Harry Cooper and Mortie Dutra, Leo Diegel, Gene Sarazen and George Von Elm.

There was no discussion or intimation that power should be developed by private parties, and Governor Chamberlain made the statement in a letter before federal agencies passed the necessary acts and he would not have signed such measure if there had been any thought that such would be the result.

Following the irrigation and reclamation development was not only well started but operating through several irrigation units, the federal government, through the department of the interior, entered into a contract with the California Oregon Power company under the terms of which the latter was to erect a dam and regulate the waters of the upper Klamath lake. This contract has been a subject of controversy ever since.

As the hearing held in Washington before a senatorial committee, the position Oregon took was that the contract to the company was null and void and that the occupancy of the company was without legal authority.

The order stated, however, that neither "the findings or failure, to make findings of the senatorial committee, nor all the hearings held on this subject, are helpful in this case, for in the end the commissioner is confronted with the definite law of regulation that ownership is not material."

The engineering staff has made an exhaustive study of the charges of fraud. The rule of proof in cases involving fraud charges requires that a finding of fraud must be supported by clear and satisfactory evidence. The commissioner failed to find such evidence.

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Gunfire Disturbs Comic Opera War

NEW ORLEANS, Aug. 7.—(AP)—Gunfire broke out in the city of New Orleans today, after a serio-comic show of armed strength for more than a week.

A sentry at Jackson Barracks, headquarters of national guardsmen called out on order of Senator Huey P. Long, fired twice at an unidentified man he said was attempting to slip into the barracks.

The sentry said that when he ordered the man behind some bushes he opened him to halt, but the man jumped him and sped away instead. The sentry fired two shots, neither of which is believed to have taken effect.

The main battleground of the "war" however, in the heart of New Orleans, remains tranquil.

Religious riots that threatened to become a pogrom appeared to be halted by military occupation of the city today, but it was feared that funerals of some of the 27 known dead might incite Arabs to further violence.

It was estimated that 100 were killed, and 200 were known to have been wounded in three days of killings and burnings, in the course of which Moslems made fierce raids in the Jewish quarter of the city.

Funerals, which it was feared might be a signal for renewal of the fighting, were postponed to tomorrow. Of the 27 known dead, 23 are Jews.
