### GAS CO-OPERATIVE PLAN PERFECTED; MEMBERS SOUGHT

Over KMED last night Frank Hull, manager of the Jackson County (oil and gas) Co-operative, announced that the organization has been perfected and the next step is to get members.

As this organization, restricted to producers of agricultural products, will mean a large saving in gas and oil purchases, and the more the membership the larger the saving will be.

The Co-operative is sanctioned by the government, operates according to the provisions of the petroleum code, and Mr. Hull also pointed out that the operation of more than one such co-operative in Jackson county would be unfortunate, for it would tend to confuse the situation and also reduce the monetary benefits to the individual.

For, he took pains to emphasize, the larger the membership the larger the per capita profits. The membership dues are \$20, but only \$5 needs to be paid down, the balance in 90 days. This money is necessary to establish a plant, equip it and distribute the gas and oil. The saving to the member in two or three months should pay for this small investment, and afterward, is dividends in lower prices will be clear profit.

The more members the greater the individual benefits, and the fact that now is the time for agriculturists to join, were particularly emphasized by the speaker.

### GRAND JURY CALL IN SEPTEMBER IS EXPECTATION NOW

The grand jury, Floyd Ross, Central Point, foreman, will hold its next session in September, according to the district attorney's office. Unless there is an increase in criminal cases, it may not convene then. But two cases are pending. One will concern the pair arrested in Sacramento yesterday for the theft of A. S. Roenbaum's auto. The other is James E. Stockman, held in the county jail, under \$5000 bonds for alleged interference with an officer during a raid on local headquarters of the "Caninery and Agricultural Workers' Union," in the old P. & E. depot.

The authorities said today that the attempt to revive agitation in this county had collapsed. The sign on the P. & E. depot of the "C. A. A. W. U." has been taken down, and the "headquarters" closed, for non-payment of rent. Several of the members have reported they were "misled," have renounced the Communist tenets, and are looking for jobs. Caroline Decker, organizer, who is said to have collected dues here, is on trial with half a dozen "comrades" at Sacramento, on a charge of "criminal syndicalism." Transient agitators, who came here to do oratorical battle have moved on. However, the appointment of 250 special deputy sheriffs and the "Citizens' Emergency Committee of 200" formed for service under "constituted authority, in case of earthquake, fire, flood, hunting for lost persons, or riot or disorder"

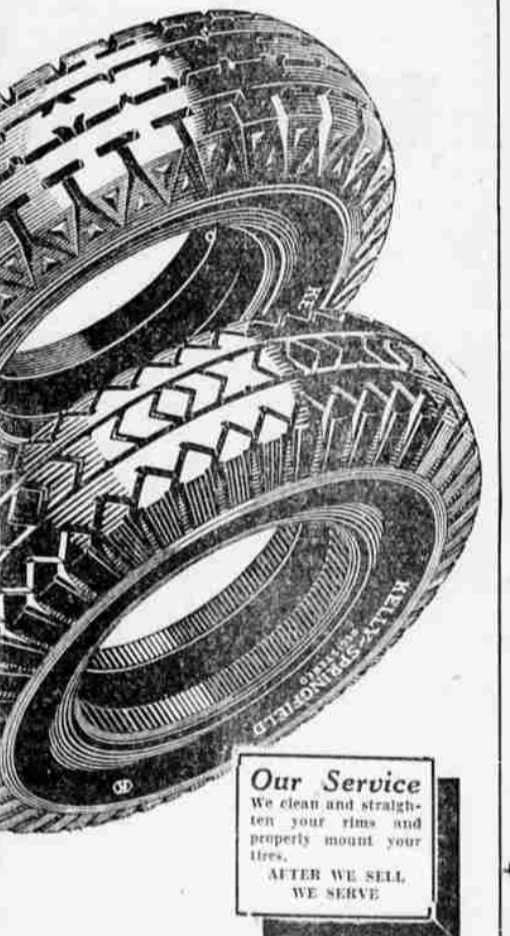
