

Lethers and Belcastro Will Furnish Grappling Fireworks Tonight

LEG WORK WILL PLAY PROMINENT PART IN MATCH

Texan to Use Figure-Four While Belcastro Stages Spectacular Drop Kick — Newman-McGill Also Aces

Anything is expected in the pending battle between "Bad" Sam Lethers, long, lumber grappler from Tex., and Pete Belcastro, "Weed Wildcat," who asked for a match and is going to get it in the main event at the armory tonight.

Because of the chamber of commerce banquet for Amos B. Cammerer, director of national parks, and Robert Fechner, director of civilian conservation corps, the card is scheduled to start at 9 o'clock. Lethers will be up against a demon wrestler when he steps into the ring tonight and has been limbering up his pair of rubber legs ready to wrap up and put away Belcastro, who also uses a pair of legs in wrestling matches. The Italian has been making use of "Jumping Joe" Savoldi's famous drop-kick, which he demonstrated last week in flattening Pat McGill, Nebraska Irishman, in less than a minute after the starting of the bout. He uses his arms to good advantage also, and swings a mean haymaker when the going gets rough.

Lethers is a favorite of the local fans, having won two straight matches here, and is pointed to take some of the fight out of Belcastro. He uses crumpling rocking-chair and figure-four actions with deadly results, and can step out of the best of wrist-locks.

McGill will again be seen in action tonight, when he tangles with Billy Newman of Denver, who referred last week's card with such good results that fans will welcome his reappearance in a more active role. Newman has a reputation for plenty of rough stuff and is a whirlwind when it comes to speed. McGill put up a losing fight against Belcastro last week and will attempt to get off to a better start tonight, to hand out some rapid-fire wrestling of his own.

For the third man in the ring, Bunny Martin, another favorite, will add his bit to the show.

Promoter Mack Lillard says tonight's card is an equal of last week's, which fans acclaimed as one of the best ever seen here, and has added another row of seats downstairs to take care of the crowd he expects. Tickets are selling at the same uniform price.

Also, they would have a very, very smart manager on the bench to direct them and if need be, go in and pinch hit, although he would probably never have to.

Without doubt, the all-star Southern Oregon league team would be a great bush league club and would be plenty tough to beat.

The All-Star Southern Oregon league team as selected by Amos C. Nining, president of the circuit, and Billy Hulen, league secretary, sees the pennant winning Grants Pass Merchants and the second place Ewauna Red Sox walk off with the majority of honors, each team placing four players. Shaw Bertram placed two on the all-star aggregation and Medford one.

Players were selected principally on their offensive strength, although defensive ability was taken into consideration also. Value to their respective teams, hustle and baseball smartness were also main points in the final choices.

Careful in Choice. Nining saw every team in action several times, while Hulen had first hand information via the playing route and coupled with suggestions made by different team members, the selections were made after careful consideration.

Probably the hardest choice to make was at second base, where Bernadou, Ewauna, and Risberg, Shaw Bertram, stood head and shoulders above all other key stone guardians. If Risberg, the former Chicago White Sox player, had been action in more games, he would have been the one picked, as he still flashes near major league form. However, Bernadou played the full schedule in bang-up style, so was selected in place of Risberg.

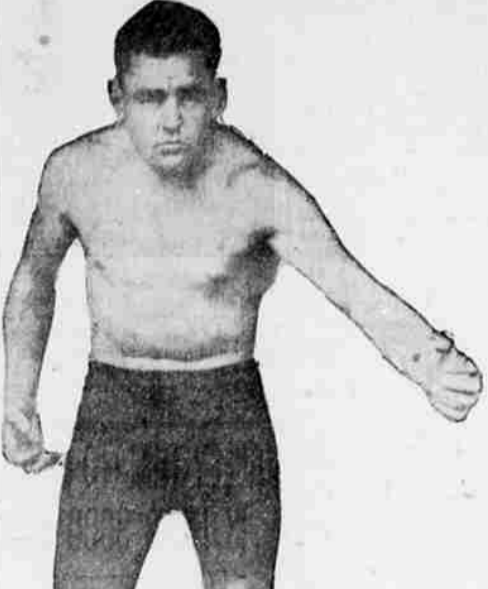
Another tough question was at first base. Haley nosed out Herman Wakeman, Shaw Bertram, due to his higher batting average and consecutive hitting streak which extended through 13 games. They were the class of the league by far at the initial sack.

Ogle Choice at Short. For shortstop, Clarence Ogle's near-competitor was Wheeler, Ewauna. Both were great fielders, but Ogle got the call on his better hitting.

At third base, Cogan, Shaw Bertram holds sway because he slapped the ball more often than McCarthy, Grants Pass. They were both consistently brilliant defensively.

In the outfield, Paul Hoffard, Medford slugger was the class of the league. He was chosen for the middle spot with no argument. Shipman, Shaw Bertram center fielder, was shifted to right, and Putnam, Ewauna, who saw some action at third base, was put in left field, his regular position, because of his tremendous hitting strength. Other good outfielders were Santee, Grants Pass, Swanson, Medford and Martin, Ewauna.

UNCLE ROBBY ROBINSON FAMED BASEBALL STAR OF OLD 'ORIOLES' DIES

ATLANTA, Aug. 9.—(AP)—That famous old Oriole, Wilbert Robinson, is dead.

Death came just as Uncle Robby, one of baseball's greatest figures, wished it—quickly and with little pain. He succumbed to a hemorrhage of the brain last night at 10:30 o'clock and his last words were about the Atlanta baseball club, of which he was president.

Robinson was 70 years old. His span of life saw him as catcher and captain of the Baltimore Orioles; saw him win two pennants at Brooklyn in the National league, and finally saw him worry himself literally sick about his club here.

For the last three days Robinson had felt badly. His Crackers were in a slump after playing good ball nearly all season. He fell suddenly while emerging from his bath just before dinner yesterday evening, and broke his arm. He was taken to a hospital.

At the hospital it was discovered he was suffering from a hemorrhage of the brain.

DROULETTE TOPS LEAGUE BATTERS AS SEASON ENDS

Grants Pass Catcher Finishes Schedule With .458 Average — Nelson of Pass Best Pitcher in Circuit

Al Droulette, Grants Pass catcher, is the 1934 Southern Oregon league batting champion. The husky receiver, whose big war club was the most important factor in the Merchants' drive to the league pennant, lapped out 27 hits in 59 trips to the plate for the mark of .458. From the fourth week of the season, Droulette has been at the top of the heap.

His nearest competitor was Clarence Ogle, his shortstopping team mate, with an average of .428. Ogle, Ewauna, and Williams, Grants Pass are tied for the nominal lead with marks of .500, but they have played in but few games.

Swede Risberg, former Chicago White Sox player, leads the Shaw Bertram team with .419.

Paul Hoffard, Medford, center fielder, finished in front of his club with an average of .323.

Leading all Southern Oregon league pitchers was Bill Nelson, blonde Grants Pass right-hander with the explosive curve ball. He won 9 and lost two games for the percentage of .818.

The second place Ewauna Red Sox topped the league in team batting with their combined mark of an even .300, while the champion Grants Pass club finished second with .286.
