Rim Camp Ground Highly Improved

CRATER LAKE NATIONAL PARK, Ore.—(Spl.)—As a result of carefully prepared plans, the rim campground in Crater Lake National Park is rapidly developing into one of the most modern camps in the country. 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Quintuplet Photo Suit Thrown Out

CHICAGO, Aug. 9.—(AP) A suit for \$100,000 damages and a petition for an injunction to halt publication of pictures of the Dionne quintuplets of Orillia, Ont., were thrown out of court today by Judge Joseph B. Davis.

The court action was taken by Ivan I. Spear, who operates the Century of Progress tour bureau at the world's fair. He named as defendants, Clara Dionne, father of the quintuplets, the Chicago Times company and a news photograph syndicate.

The bill claimed that on May 31 Dionne signed a contract with the Century of Progress tour bureau to come to Chicago with the quintuplets for exhibition purposes, as soon as physicians would permit the trip, and that the contract also granted the tour bureau the right to handle all publicity.

Judge Davis held that the quintuplets were world figures and that there was nothing wrong in any newspaper publishing pictures of them.

Woman Killed in Penthouse Blast

NEW YORK, Aug. 9.—(AP) A woman was killed yesterday when a blast rocked four apartments on a penthouse floor of a 22-story building in the heart of Greenwich Village.

The victim was Miss Jeanette Baer, rental agent of the apartment building. She was found unconscious near the apartment in which the explosion occurred.

Police said the explosion occurred in the apartment of Miss Zara Reiga, who is away on a vacation. Detectives who found Miss Baer expressed the belief that she, as rental agent, had gone there to examine the premises.

Captain Thomas Murphy said the explosion was apparently accidental, that it was caused by the ignition of an accumulation of gas in the kitchen of the apartment by a pilot light on the stove.

Fairbanks Joins Schenck's Return

NICE, France, Aug. 9.—(AP)—Douglas Fairbanks, Sr., despite an announcement earlier in the day that he was going to China, sailed today on the S. S. Rex from Villafranca for the United States.

With him sailed Jos. M. Schenck, film executive, who proudly displayed a gold cigarette case as an engagement present from Merle Oberon, new British film star.

Fairbanks, who decided at the last minute to accompany Schenck, indicated they would both return to London within two months for Schenck's wedding, then go to China to make a film with Chinese actors.

Johnson Returns to Littered Desk

WASHINGTON, Aug. 9.—(AP) Hugh S. Johnson returned to a cluttered desk today to steer NRA into its second year.

Now that code making is virtually finished, the recovery unit enters the uncharted seas of compliance. New set-ups must be manned to see that industry lives up to its covenants.

Problems galore faced Johnson, just back from a "vacation" mostly spent in seeking to get employers and strikers to agree. Topping all the problems was the question just what NRA will be like in the future, an issue that the president and congress must decide.

Santiago Communists Cause Military Rule

SANTIAGO, Cuba, Aug. 9.—(AP)—The army took over Santiago today after a series of communist disorders during which one soldier was gravely wounded.

The soldier was shot when troops dispersed a communist demonstration in front of a shoe factory which had been closed because of a strike.
