

Chan Egan Will Enter National Amateur Golf Tourney

FORMER CHAMPS GIVEN EXEMPTION FROM QUALIFYING

Record Number Seek Right To Enter Tourney Starting September 10—Dunlap Is Defending Champion

H. Chandler Egan of Medford announced last night that he will enter the National Amateur championship starting at the country club at Brookline, Mass., Sept. 10, in which 754 golfers will compete. Egan will leave for the east about Sept. 1.

NEW YORK, Aug. 11.—(AP)—Seven hundred and fifty-four golfers would like to play in the national amateur championship starting at the country club at Brookline, Mass., Sept. 10, an increase of 153 over the entries for the 1933 tournament.

The United States Golf association has limited the field at Brookline to 180 players. Thirteen of these, headed by the defending champion, George Dunlap, automatically are assigned to the championship, leaving the other 167 hopefuls to fight it out for 167 places in a nation-wide 36-hole medal play qualifying round in 24 sections Aug. 21.

Exempt from the qualifying test along with Dunlap are ten other former champions—Chandler Egan, Bob Gardner, Francis Oulmet, Chick Evans, Davy Herron, Jesse Guilford, Jess Sweetser, Max Marston, Harrison (Jimmy) Johnson, and Ross Somerville—and Lawson Little, present British amateur titleholder, and Rex Hartley, former British Walker cup star.

ROME STAGGERED BY NEWS CARNERA LOST ON LEVEL

ROME, Italy, Aug. 11.—(AP)—Italian sporting circles were staggered tonight by the publication of the findings of the Italian boxing federation that Primo Carnera, the national flat hero, lost his heavyweight championship to Max Baer under reasonably fair circumstances.

This Italy has refused to believe. Papers here had charged that gangsters forced Carnera to lose by threatening him, that he was fouled, doped and even hypnotized.

The report holds, however, that the fight was fought "substantially" according to rules and blamed Carnera's downfall (eleven times) to "imprudent and mistaken ring strategy."

"The irregularities committed by Baer during the fight were taken into account in the point calculation," the report says, "and the referee stopped the fight because he judged Carnera unable further to defend himself efficiently."
