

### WALKER TO FIGHT CORBETT TONIGHT

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 14. — (AP) — Back by choice in the middleweight division, where he put on some of his most thrilling battles, Mickey Walker will make a new bid for ring laurels here tonight in a 10-round bout that pits him against one of the trickiest left-handers in the business, Young Corbett of Fresno.

The 33-year-old Walker, who lost the welterweight championship, only to win the middleweight crown and side-tracked his title obligations in the latter division to have a fling in the heavyweight crowd, has decided to make his last stand in boxing as a 160-pounder.

### SEATTLE ENJOYING WEEK'S SOFT SPOT

There's a chance Portland may misbehave—the Beavers licked Oakland last week—but the odds are all in favor of Dutch Reuther's tribe.

### SHIELDS QUALIFIES FOR FOURTH ROUND

NEWPORT, R. I., Aug. 14. — (AP) — Francis X. Shields, member of the U. S. Davis Cup singles forces and the defending finalist in the current Newport Casino tennis play, today qualified for the fourth round by breezing through Eddie Jacobs of Baltimore, 6-3, 6-3.

Shields relied almost entirely upon speed and had his forehand strokes well under control as he ousted the experienced Baltimore player and entered the quarter-finals, which will be over the three-out-of-five sets distance, against another rugged opponent, J. Gilbert Hall of New York.

### OFFER FARMERS WATERED LANDS

WASHINGTON, Aug. 14. — (AP) — The reclamation bureau today told drought-ridden farmers seeking the relative security of irrigated lands, that approximately 300 farms were available on the Riverton reclamation project in Wyoming.

Vacancies are comparatively few who stacked up against the demand, but the bureau said it is "doing everything possible to give opportunities where they exist."

Seventeen of the 27 reclamation areas in the scorched west have water to last all season, one back forward to the best crops in years. While 10 expect some water abatement, officials said they would be far better off than adjacent unirrigated tracts.

### 3-C BOYS HALT FIRE AT TRAIL
