MEDFORD GIVEN LOWER AIRWAY EXPRESS RATES W. J. Martindale, traffic agent for the Railway Express agency, who arrived here yesterday from San Francisco, announced today that a great reduction, effective today, is being made in airway express rates. These changes will be effective on the United Air Lines ships through Medford. The reductions, Mr. Martindale said, show a decrease of about two-thirds from listing of three years ago. The changes are effective throughout the Railway Express system. The minimum charge is now 85 cents, instead of a dollar as previously, according to Mr. Martindale.
