

SOUTHERN OREGON TRAFFIC INCREASE SHOWN BY CHECK

2649 More Autos Counted Sunday Than Year Ago—Redwood Highway Junction Enjoys Great Growth

Showing an increase in travel of 2649 over 1933, the traffic check taken in south Oregon last Sunday, as compared to Sunday, August 13, 1933, has been released by J. G. Bromley, resident maintenance engineer for the state highway department at Grants Pass.

The greatest increase, 598, was shown north of the junction with the Redwood highway south of Grants Pass, while a decrease of 618 was listed one mile south of Medford. The latter checking point has, in the past, ordinarily shown the highest gain. Increases were found at all but three of the checking stations. A decrease of 84 was seen on the Crater lake highway, east of the junction with the Diamond lake road, and a decrease of one on the county road to Central Point.

There were 28,737 cars checked last Sunday, in comparison with 24,088 a year ago.

Checking on the Pacific highway, with this year's results first, and 1933 figures following, are: North of junction with Coos Bay-Roseburg highway at Coos junction, 1724; 1320. South of the junction with Coos Bay-Roseburg highway at Coos junction, 1437; 1149. Summit of stage road pass, 954; 854. North of junction with the Redwood highway south of Grants Pass, 4041; 3443. South of junction with the secondary No. 261 south of Grants Pass, 2048; 1676. One mile south of Medford, 3740; 4358. North of junction with Green Springs highway, 1594; 1294. South of the junction with the Green Springs highway, 895; 874.

Green Springs highway junction with the Pacific highway, 617; 562. On the Crater lake highway: South of junction with the county road to Central Point, 1922; 1170. On county road to Central Point, 248; 249. North of junction with county road to Central Point, 1381; 1232. West of the junction with the Diamond lake road, 614; 404. On Diamond lake road, 225; 109. East of junction with the Diamond lake road, 413; 497.

On the Redwood highway, south of junction with Oregon Caves highway, 862; 734. North of junction with Oregon Caves highway, 1033; 879. Junction with Pacific highway, 1630; 1486.

The Coos Bay-Roseburg highway junction with the Pacific highway at Coos junction, 845; 477. Oregon Caves highway junction with Redwood highway, 413; 323. Williams secondary highway on the county road, 331; 311. Williams secondary highway, south of junction with county road, 770; 570.

Another summary of traffic count was released by Mr. Bromley, concerning new highways, as follows: Pacific highway, north of junction with Tiller-Trail secondary highway at Canyonville, 1234, and the Pacific highway south of junction with Tiller-Trail secondary highway at Canyonville, 1047; Tiller-Trail secondary highway junction with Pacific highway at Canyonville, 218. Williams secondary highway west of junction with Medford-Provoit secondary highway at Provoit, 269. Williams secondary highway south of junction with Medford-Provoit secondary highway Coos junction, 575; 477. Oregon Caves highway on the county road, 331; at Provoit, 196; Medford-Provoit secondary highway junction with Williams secondary highway at Provoit, 215, showing a total of 3179 cars checked.

CIRCUIT COURT TAKES VACATION

Circuit court is now on annual August vacation, with no sessions and transaction of no business save routine matters. Judge H. D. Norton is utilizing the time for rendering opinions and clearing up pending routine matters.

No sessions of grand or petit jury are scheduled until September—possibly not until the October term of court, which starts the third Monday in that month.

Few criminal cases await grand jury action. One is the case of Jas. E. Stockman, held on a charge of attempting to rescue a prisoner when a raid was launched on the headquarters of the "Cannery and Agricultural Union" in the old P. & E. depot last month. A large amount of communistic literature and a partial list of valley members were seized in a search of Stockman's home. Stockman was the literary distributing agent for this section, the authorities claim.

SEE SEA MONSTER AT GREAT DEPTH

HAMILTON, Bermuda, Aug. 16.—(AP)—A huge deep sea fish, probably the curious alga which greeted Dr. William Beebe, American scientist, in a daring record-breaking descent toward the bottom of the ocean.

The undersea explorer and his associate, Otis Barton, were unable to identify the monster they sighted from their "Bathysphere" yesterday. Sealed in the two-ton iron ball, Beebe and Barton were lowered to a depth of 3,028 feet, more than half a mile under the surface. The descent exceeded their record of last Saturday by 518 feet and surpassed their earlier mark of a half a mile by 388 feet.

A large gray "shadow" at 2,750 feet was the first appearance of the unknown fish. The object seemed to be illuminated by scores of tiny lights, glittering like a diamond necklace, Dr. Beebe said. He estimated its length at 20 feet.

MILK SUNDAY PROVES UNIQUE OCCASION FOR MEMBERS OF GRANGE

A more unique Grange event has never been held in the United States than was recently staged in a rural church just outside the city of Rochester, New York, when the pastor, who is the energetic chaplain of the New York State Grange, put on a "Milk Sunday" observance, to which he invited Grangers from a wide area, the occasion being honored by the presence of many officers, not only of the New York State Grange, but of the two other large agricultural groups of the Empire state, the Dairyman's League and the Farm Bureau Federation.

This alert pastor preached a stirring sermon on the topic, "A land flowing with milk and honey, which is the glory of all lands," in which he traced the history of milk as the most universal food of all nations; pointed out its health-giving properties and indicated the benefit which would follow if its consumption in America could be doubled; all the time painting a background picture of what prosperity to the dairy industry would mean to the nation as a whole.

GRIM ALCATRAZ RECEIVES FIRST INCORRIGIBLES

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 16.—(AP)—The federal government's newest prison, a gray-walled stronghold on the solid rock of San Francisco bay's Alcatraz island, today holds its first convicts—47 men classed as incorrigibles.

Disclosure that the convicts had been transferred secretly from other western prisons was made yesterday by Warden James A. Johnston, after the latest group, 14 dangerous criminals from McNeill island, was safely under lock and key.

George "Red" Kerr, former Chicago gangster, who participated in the \$235,000 Sacramento postoffice robbery in 1932, is among the most notorious of the newly-arrived convicts, prison officials said.

Future transfers to the island penitentiary, around which the swirling currents sweeping through the Golden Gate form a natural barrier to escape, will also be made with utmost secrecy, officials said.

The criminals to be confined were described by United States Attorney-General Homer S. Cummings, who arrived here to inspect the prison, as those who seek to maintain outside connections, refuse to conform to discipline and are "potential jail-breakers."

Whether Al Capone and other notorious convicts will be brought to the prison, Cummings said, depends entirely upon their conduct at the penitentiaries in which they are now incarcerated.
