

BUTTER ADVANCES IN PORTLAND MART

PORTLAND, Ore., Aug. 16.—(AP)—The produce exchange advanced butter 1/2 cent on cube extras and standard. Butterfat was advanced 1 cent generally.

There was increasing demand for eggs of quality. Generally quiet trading tone was showing for live poultry.

The turkey crop this season is about a month early. Some toms of the new crop were offered up to 15 lbs and even hens to 8 and 10 lbs. Quality was good.

Weak trade was suggested for country killed lambs with an extreme of 10c.

Demand was keen for quality peaches with Willamette valley and The Dalles stock in insufficient supply to take care of needs.

Market for tomatoes was without general change either in price or sentiment for the day.
