

### SOUTHERN OREGON SAILORS, SOLDIERS REUNION, AUG. 30

Forty-second annual reunion of the Southern Oregon Soldiers' and Sailors' Allied organizations will be held Thursday, August 30, in the Medford armory from 10 a. m. to 4 p. m., with election of officers, a covered dish luncheon, and a patriotic program.

Registration and giving out badges, for which a fee of 25 cents will be asked, will open the business session, which will include elections and selection of a meeting place for the next reunion. Present officers who will be replaced by those newly elected are: Colonel-commander, J. C. Woods, Medford; lieutenant, E. W. Madison, Grants Pass; major, C. Vroman, Gold Hill; adjutant, Bill E.
