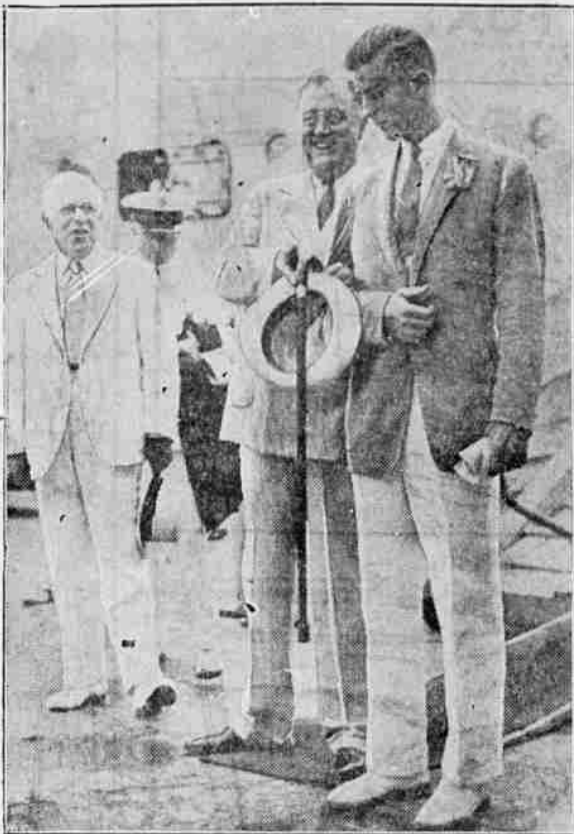


PRESIDENT'S VACATION SMILE



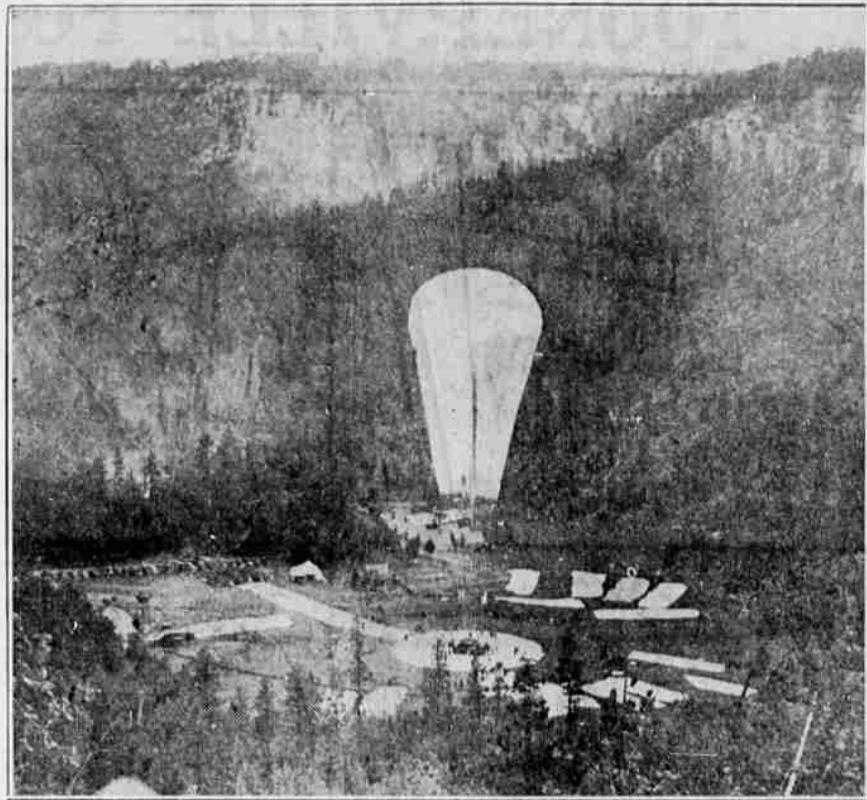

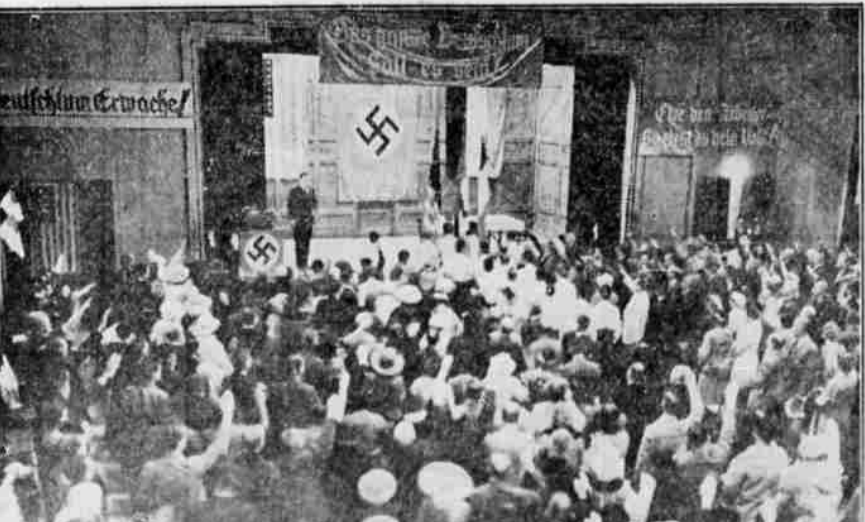
