210,000 TROUT IN MOUNTAIN LAKES OF BLUE CANYON

Sixteen mountain lakes, in the Blue Canyon region northeast of Mt. McLaughlin, will be stocked with nearly 210,000 cutthroat and rainbow trout, with planting operations starting Tuesday, August 21, it was announced yesterday by Rogue River national forest officials.

The project will open within a short time one of the most popular fishing regions of Oregon. It is the belief of forest service officials, as the lakes of Blue Canyon already attract many hikers and anglers. Smith has been spending several weeks in the region, completing a report on the logical distribution of the fish. He states that all 16 lakes are capable of holding a stock for many years, as there is adequate depth and an abundant food supply.

Some of the lakes have been previously stocked. Smith reports, but most of the supply has been depleted during the past few years. Four of the lakes having outlets leading to the south fork of Rogue river are Blue lake, Lone Lake, Horseshoe lake and Pear lake. Campers and sportsmen frequent Blue lake, Island lake and Margaret lake in great numbers, Smith stated.

Distribution of the fish, which will require two men making two trips per day for six days, will be as follows: Cutthroat trout: Notaka lake, 5,000; Three unnamed lakes, 50,000; Heavenly Twins, 23,000; Donna lake, 5,000; Dovetail lake, 25,000; Margaret lake, 20,000; Cliff lake, 5,000; total, 133,000.

Rainbow trout: Pear lake, 5,000 to 8,000; Horseshoe lake, 10,000 to 15,000; Lone lake, 10,000 to 12,000; Blue lake, 12,000 to 15,000; Round lake, 2,000; Island lake, 20,000 to 25,000; total (maximum), 77,000.

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NO CHANNEL SWIM RECORD SMASHED

DOVER, England, Aug. 18.—(AP)—Emma Faber, Austrian woman, was given credit for a short time today with having broken all records for swimming the English channel, but a re-check of the time she left the French shore at Gris Nez for the chalk cliffs of Dover quickly set the situation right.

It was announced that the sturdy Austrian had plunged into the channel at 6:30 a. m. on one side, and climbed out at 3:15 p. m. on the other, an all but unbelievable elapsed time of 8 hours, 45 minutes. This was amended later, however, to 12:45 a. m. for the starting time, and 3:25 p. m. for the finish, giving her a total time of 14 hours, 45 minutes. Not even the fastest time ever made by a woman.
