

# EGAN LAUGHS AT FATHER TIME ON BIRTHDAY ROUND

### Medford Wizard Cards Sparkling 69 With 16 Pars, Two Birdies, in Heat As Time Tolls 50th Year

A record of some sort was made on the Medford golf course yesterday.

In the first place it was 100 in the shade. In the second place it was Chan Egan's 50th birthday. In the third place Chan had just made the front page, as the oldest former amateur golf champion to be admitted to the championship tourney at Philadelphia, without going thru a qualifying round.

Chan decided to celebrate reaching the half century mark. Also the fact he is to play for the title again this year. Selecting a caddy young enough to be his grandson, and his new British made clubs, Chan slammed a screamer through the heat from the first tee, got a perfect second shot, and proceeded to take 2 putts for a par four.

#### Shoots Flock of Pars

He got his par on the next hole. And on the next. And the next. And so on until getting tired of pars he pulled a couple of birdies. He would have had a flock of the latter if a few of the falls that stopped on the lip of the cup hadn't been so swollen by the heat they refused to drop in.

But there was nothing "swollen" about Chan. As usual he was lean as a wolfhound, and tough as nails, and no tension in his hat band. The weather was hot but he was nothing hot about Chan but his game.

So on the revamped course, longer by over 100 yards than the old course he shot a sweet 69—16 pars, two birdies—and came in under reefs, as smoothly as a Vanderbilt cup winner.

How's that for a golfer of two score and ten? It wasn't so much anational golf as perfect golf—which is a lot better. There wasn't a scratch hit in the entire 18. The ball was straight for the pin, all the way.

# WORLD NET BODY PLANS CURE FOR FOOT FAULT EVIL

### Sole Distressing Feature of Great Game May Be Eliminated by Use of Rear Auxiliary Base Line

LONDON.—(AP)—The International Lawn Tennis federation at last is making a serious effort to abolish the foot-fault, the one distressing feature of an otherwise almost flawless sport.

By next season, if the recommendation of a special committee is approved by all the member nations, the game's greatest mental hazard to players and its biggest pain in the neck to fans will virtually have been removed.

What the committee plans to propose as the next annual meeting in March, 1935, is that an auxiliary line be drawn at a distance of two feet behind the base line.

Makes for Mental Ease.

The server would be required to keep one foot behind this new line throughout his delivery, but otherwise could deport himself about as he pleased. He wouldn't have to worry about whether, in throwing himself into his swing, one foot was crossing the baseline before he clouted the ball.

The only drawback seems to be that the new scheme is bound to reduce the speed of service. The added two feet makes the angle of flight more difficult, and all except the tallest players probably would have to ease up some on their first serve to keep it inside the court.

That might not be a bad idea, either, as there has been something of a campaign recently against the use of so-called cannonball services, on the ground that it gives the unusually tall player a big advantage.

They Couldn't See 'Em.

It was noted during Wimbledon that some of the linemen couldn't tell within a foot or where some of Lee Steffen's scorers struck the grass. Several times the towering Californian was credited with aces on balls that seemed easily a foot past the service line. The bewildered linemen could only blink and say: "I thing."

# PACIFIC OUTBOARD RACES TO FEATURE ASTORIA'S REGATTA

### ASTORIA, Ore., Aug. 22.—(AP)—The Pacific coast outboard racing association will be held in Oregon waters for the first time this year during the 1934 Astoria regatta, August 30 and 31, and September 1.

Last year 80 swift speedboats gathered at Seattle for the events and an equal number are expected here this year. Over \$1000 in prize money and about \$1000 in expense money will be paid to the drivers, including a number of nationally known figures in outboard racing.

The races will be held around a new course already laid out in Young's bay, where the waters are quieter than the stretches of the Columbia river, site of outboard races at recent Astoria regattas.

There will be hydroplane races for classes A, B, C and in both the professional and amateur divisions. There will also be the run-about races.

In addition the regatta race features will include a large number of sail boat events, which are attracting entries from all along the coast, as well as the usual fish boat and canny tender races and the tugboat "tag of war."

Topping off the Pacific coast's biggest water show will be the "Pratt's Den" fun, festival and other attractions.

# English Woman Listed as Best Tennis Player

PARIS, France, Aug. 22.—(AP)—Dorothy Round of England gets the call over Helen Jacobs of the United States as the best woman player in the world in a compilation of the first ten announced today by Pierre Gillou, president of the International Tennis federation.

The United States had three players on the list: Helen Jacobs, Sarah Falfrey and Carolin Babcock.
